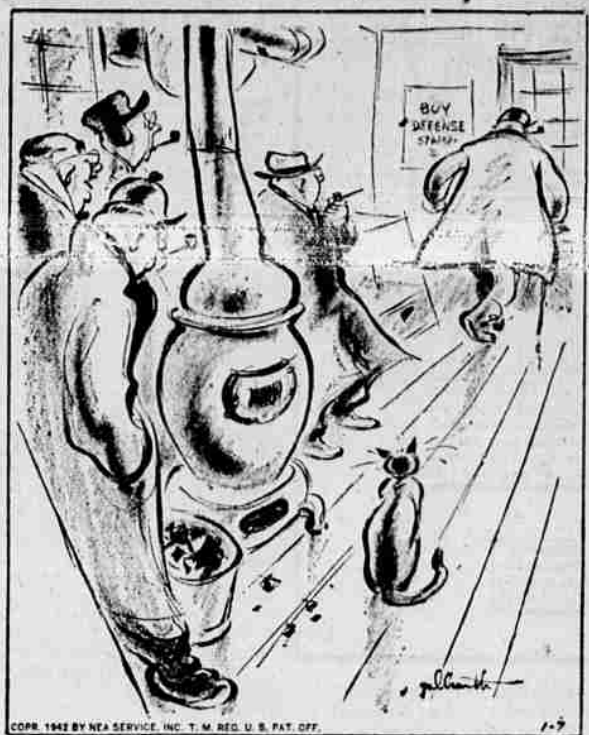

Harry Bridges To Seek Citizenship

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Harry Bridges, waterfront labor leader, will seek American citizenship immediately, his office said today, after the board of immigration appeals in Washington had recommended cancellation of deportation proceedings against him.

The Bridges defense committee, which represented him in two deportation actions, issued a statement declaring Bridges "will seek citizenship as quickly as is permitted." He was unable to do so earlier, the statement said "because of the long persecution which began during the 1934 Pacific coast maritime strike."

"Now that he has been twice found innocent," the committee report said, "we trust there will be no further delay in permitting him to take his rightful place in American life."

Bridges, born in Australia, had been accused by the immigration department of affiliation with communists. He came to this country in 1920. The board of immigration appeals held that since his arrival in America he was not a member or affiliated with the communist party.

Women in Jobs to Free Men for War Government Plan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The government expects women to work in factories, on farms and in stores and offices wherever they can take the place of men who are fit for the army or navy in gradual mobilization of the nation's fighting and production power for total war.

Brig. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, director of the selective service, outlined this "new selective" in a radio address last night and added that only one thing would determine the eventual size of the army—"It must be large enough to win this war."

The selective service system will expect industry and agriculture to use to the maximum individuals who do not possess the capacities for service in the armed forces," Hershey said. "The selective service system will expect a gradual but constant substitution of women for men who are fit to fight."

Hershey also said that although registration of previously unregistered men between the ages of 20 and 44 has been set for Feb. 16, enrollment would be permitted earlier—possibly the preceding Saturday or Sunday—to avoid interference with production.

Selective service officials estimated approximately 9,000,000 men would be enrolled at the registration, the first of two or more such enrollments in prospect.

Officials explained that those to be registered February 16 were men 20 years old, those who have turned 21 since the registration last July, and men between 36 and 44.

All men must register under the law. The president may exempt persons residing in the United States who are not citizens and who have not declared their intention to become citizens, but other non-citizens must register.

A native of Switzerland residing in the United States, for example, would have to register if he has taken out his first citizenship papers but has not become a citizen. If he had not declared intention to become a citizen he could be exempted by presidential order.

The return of the ship yard, which held \$493,000,000 in naval and merchant ship construction contracts when the navy seized it on August 25 after a CIO strike, was authorized by an executive order signed by President Roosevelt yesterday, Knox said.

The navy secretary, in a formal statement, said that "any unsettled issues between the company and the union should be settled by negotiation and agreement."

If this proves impossible, he added, the parties should take recourse to the machinery established recently by Mr. Roosevelt for peaceful settlement of all disputes in war industries.

A strike of CIO industrial union of marine and shipbuilding workers started at the plant August 7. The union, claiming a membership of 16,000 among the 18,000 workers, contended that the management refused to grant a contract including a maintenance of union clause, as recommended by the defense mediation board.

Would Restore Rank of Late Col. Mitchell

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The senate military committee recommended today that the rank of Brigadier General be restored to the late Col. William L. Mitchell, whose war army air chief, whose outspoken criticism of army policy resulted in his court martial.
