So when he sits down to a chat and tells you, matter of factly, that he can't see what he has to worry about from Joe Louis, you have to come pretty close to believing him.

He tells you this, mind you, in a tone about as worked up and tense as a fellow asking "please put a head on my beer." The big guy is no more scared than a Wake Island marine.

This is definitely not a fighter giving his courage a shot in the arm with big talk. It's not brother Maxie Baer, loud-talking for weeks before his big flop-eroo with Louis and then resting on one knee shaking his head as the referee asked him to get up. If Buddy is afraid of what might happen in his nose-flattening frolics with Louis in Madison Square Garden Friday night, then he ought to have Barrymore's profile—because he's every bit the actor.

"Look," he explained today as he started tapering off for his second crack at the heavyweight title. "I took Joe's Sunday shots last May and I'm still alive. Right? Sam Caraway is home from a visit in Grants Pass during the Christmas vacation. Phil Hart took care of his pool hall while he was away.

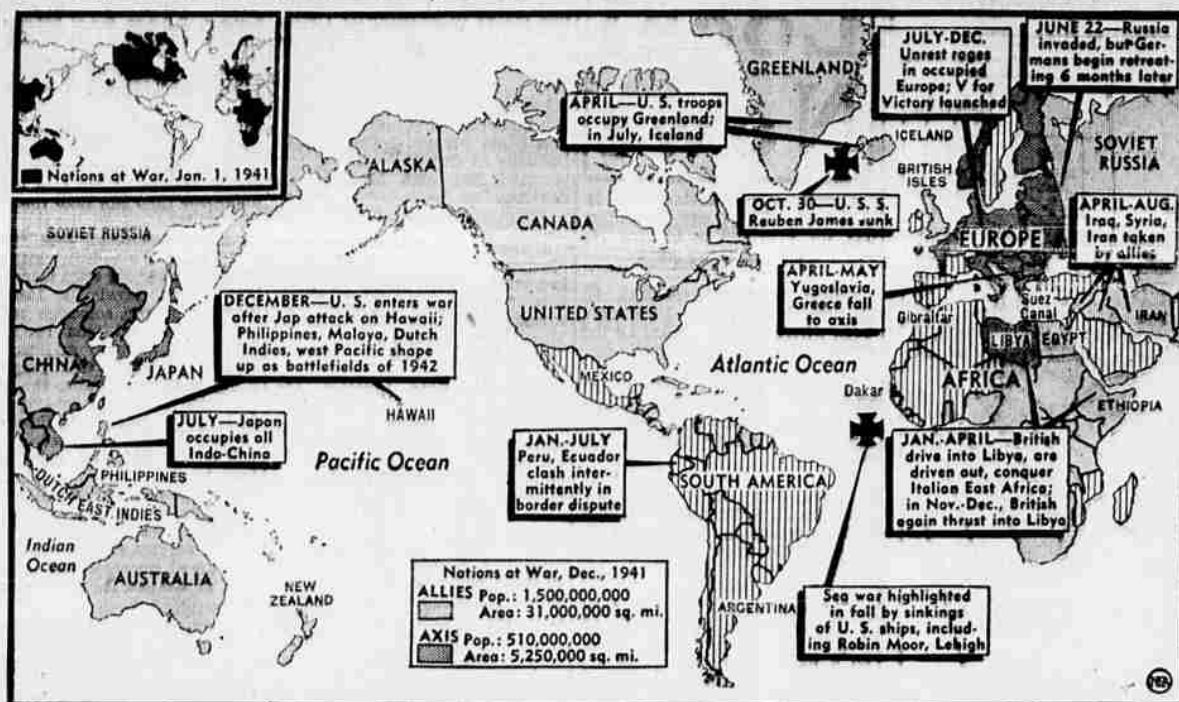

Nazi Spy Charges Denied by Five

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Four men, including Kurt Frederick Ludwig, 38-year-old American-born son of German parents, and one woman pleaded innocent in federal court yesterday to an indictment charging conspiracy to violate the espionage law and were held in bail totaling \$115,000 for trial January 14.

Ludwig, reputed head of the spy ring; Rene C. Froelich, 31; Hans Helmut Pagel, 20, and Frederick Edward Schlosser, 19, were each held in \$25,000 bail, and Mrs. Helen Pauline Mayer's former bail of \$10,000 was increased to \$15,000.

Judge Simon Rifkind asked Ludwig if he understood the nature of the proceedings when he pleaded innocent.

"I understand nothing of the court's procedure of the United States," Ludwig said. Ludwig was arrested in eastern Washington last summer on charges of sending abroad information concerning the strength of the United States army—specifically, that he sent out information on the disposition, numerical strength and equipment of the army.

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Cop in Seattle Beats Japanese In Art of Ju-Jitsu

SEATTLE, Jan. 6.—(AP)—A 51-year-old, Danish-born policeman who claims he can out-ju-jitsu the Japanese is just about the busiest extra-curricular teacher in town.

Svend Jens Jorgensen, a 210-pound patrolman, who says he would really be better at the oriental art if he could lose about 10 pounds, is a ju-jitsu teacher for law enforcement officers of the northwest, home guardsmen and now a navy officer has asked for his services.

Jorgensen, a copper for 22 years, is no amateur at what Webster calls "the Japanese art of self-defense without weapons, which depends for its efficiency largely upon the principle of making use of an opponent's strength and weight to disable or injure him." He has written four books on the subject, and insists that only about 10 per cent of his tricks were adopted from the Japanese.

"My stuff is original," he emphasized. "Of course, I've picked up the best tricks the Japs have, and incorporated them into my own system. But there isn't an Oriental in Tokyo who could stand up to my stuff for 30 seconds. Correction—make it 20 seconds."

How did a native of Denmark become such an expert at an Oriental art?

"Well, I got started on it after three fellows on the police force were shot in one night back in 1921," the good natured patrolman explained. "I figured we had to find a better way of self-defense. I learned ju-jitsu and became a police instructor in 1924."

"Sometimes they ask me: 'What if a man had a gun and was 10 feet away?' Well, maybe it wouldn't be so good. I have to admit I can't reach that far."

But Jorgensen hasn't done so bad for a fellow without a superman reach. He has a record of 67 captures without firing a shot.

C., Jan. 6.—(CP)—Determined to join the royal Canadian air force, three young Americans drove into near-by New Westminster today in an ancient open model sports roadster with apple boxes protecting the heads of two from the 17 above zero temperature and oozles shielding the eyes of the driver.
