Golden Gate Fair Site Asked for by U. S. Navy

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Navy Secretary Knox "urgently suggests" that Treasure Island, mid-bay site of the 1939-40 Golden Gate International exposition, be handed over to the navy department, permanently and completely, with all possible speed.

He telegraphed San Francisco's Mayor Rossi yesterday asking that an enabling act be introduced during the coming session of the state legislature, opening January 12, and that negotiations between the city and county of San Francisco and the 12th naval district start immediately.

Rear Admiral John W. Green, commandant of the 12th naval district, commented that "since the beginning of the war it has been increasingly evident that the navy would ultimately have to take action toward acquiring title to Treasure Island."

Developments on the island under a \$4,000,000 appropriation have been under way for some time, he said "and it is contrary to navy policy to make expenditures for such developments on leased property."

Another Jap Sub-Boat Sunk, Cruiser Damaged

Mook disclosed completion of a scorched earth program for any part of valuable islands which may come under the Jap control. Gen. Sir Archibald Wavel, the supreme commander in the Far East, has disclosed that headquarters of the Far Eastern command will be in the Netherlands isles. It is believed also that United Nations in their general program of reinforcing their Far Eastern troops are hurrying not only air and land contingents but portions of their fleet as well to their Dutch possessions.

Singapore Pressure Mounts

At Singapore this morning revealed that the Malayan peninsula situation continues to be one of extreme gravity. Withdrawals were admitted in order to bring the far weaker allied forces to strong natural positions pending the arrival of planes and men from Australia and from the British isles. The movement of Chi-

nese troops from the peninsula and into Burma went forward as Gen. Chiang-Kai-Shek continues reaping the victory at Changsha, thousands of Japanese being slain and other thousands made prisoners in a notable victory. The story of developments in Russia was highly encouraging to the allies, very depressing to the axis. This morning as result of continued operations of giant axis armies battle lines were being well drawn back of the point selected by Hitler and his generals as the winter camp of the nazis.

Tarchoff, the Russian Tzar, was directly in the advancing path of the Russians, who relied upon the cold steel of their bayonets to oust the German troops. In the Crimea the story of Russian victory was even more spectacular. They had effected landings in the rear of Hitler's armies on the Sevastopol front and were moving to close the bottleneck of military entrapment.

Finns Send Peace Envoy.

To the north today the Finns were disclosed to have dispatched their former minister to Russia on a peace mission to Stockholm. This provided new evidence that Finland is anxious to get out of the war and a desire that was spurred today by sensational victory for Russia in the island area of the Baltic.

In the Mediterranean area, British planes battered at Sicily this morning while a great storm delayed action in Libya and on the Cretean border. Ground and air visibility was limited as General Rommel's lines were battered by the artillery and aviation operations.

Sally Rand, Cowboy Turk Greenough Wedded

GLENDORA, Cal., Jan. 7 (AP)—Sally Rand, of the fans and bubbles, and cowboy Thurkel (Turk) Greenough were married yesterday in the Episcopal church parish hall.

Earlier plans to hold the ceremony in the church had been abandoned when the bishop reminded the rector that the canons prohibit a church marriage for a divorced person unless he is the injured party in a decree obtained because of infidelity. Thus rector Henry Scott Ruble stepped aside, and the ceremony was performed by the Rev. George W. Bunton, a retired Methodist minister, who has been teaching first aid at a nearby C. C. C. camp.
