WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The government today ordered approximately 60 per cent of the nation's distilleries to turn their available facilities into production of industrial alcohol.

## Prison Dealt Ex-Mayor, Also Joe Louis' Ex-Boss

DETROIT, Jan. 8.—Former Mayor Richard W. Reading Wednesday was sentenced to from four to five years in Jackson prison by Circuit Court Judge Earl C. Pugsley on charges of conspiracy to obstruct justice in the operations of a \$10,000,000 policy and numbers game. Also sentenced with Reading were 14 suspended policemen and ten alleged gamblers, including John Roxborough, co-manager of heavyweight Champion Joe Louis. Roxborough was sentenced to two and one-half to five years in prison.

## Civilian Defense Job Shifted to War Dept.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The house decided tentatively today to shift financial responsibility for the nation's civilian defense from Mayor La Guardia of New York to the war department.

Action to give war department authority to control civilian defense spending came on a vote of 110 to 58 as the house considered legislation authorizing expenditure of \$100,000,000 to provide safeguards against aerial attacks.
