Oregon to Join Washington For Industry Progress

Portland, Ore., Jan. 8.—(AP)—Oregon and Washington will unite in planning for industrial development under a program worked out by Governor Sprague of Oregon, Governor Langlie of Washington and Dr. Paul J. Raver, Bonneville administrator.

Raver, said David Eccles, Oregon budget director, Pat Hetherington, aide to Langlie, and Paul Bloch, chief of the Bonneville marketing staff, would draft the program.

Establishment of basic metal and chemical industries and the manufacture of finished products will be the chief goal.

The two states hope to develop their resources fully for war production and effect a stable economy after the war.

Hydroelectric power, vital to new plants, is nowhere so available as in the Pacific northwest, Raver said. By the end of fiscal 1943, the Bonneville administration will be producing 400,000 kilowatts more than present contracts call for.

Aluminum and steel will be needed in increasing amounts under the president's war production program, he pointed out, and the Bonneville power supply is now adequate to permit immediate establishment of aluminum fabricating plants.

An integrated iron and steel industry is feasible in the northwest, Raver said, on the basis of studies made over the past two years.

Fabricating plants in the northwest would eliminate transportation delays in the war program.

"We in the northwest cannot help win the peace if, upon conclusion of the war, all our new industry shuts down and throws thousands of men out of work."

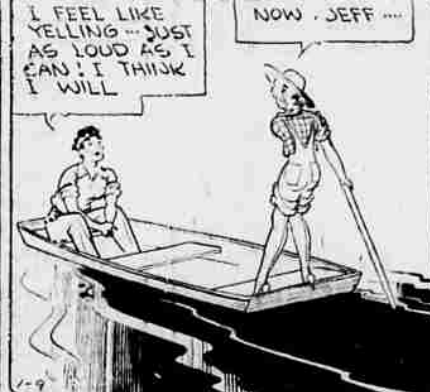
