## BOOKS OF INTEREST RECEIVED AT ROSEBURG PUBLIC LIBRARY

New and interesting books received at the Roseburg public library include:

**TOUGHEN UP, AMERICA** by Victor G. Heiser, M. D. What to do to improve one's health as a part of the defense program. The author of *An American Doctor's Odyssey* thinks Americans are too soft and fat; he offers useful suggestions for reducing, exercising, sleeping, dieting, using sun and air. Colds and germs are also discussed.

**ALL IN A LIFETIME** by Frank Buck. Throughout the world the name of Frank Buck is synonymous with courage and daring. His sensational exploits as an animal hunter and trainer are legendary. This is the story of a boy born with an itching foot, who grew up to find success by not knowing the meaning of the words "can't" and "fear." He unfolds for us his adventures in the glamorous ports and countries of the exotic east; his voyages with his precious two and four-footed cargoes and his filling of orders for the rarest game from the zoos of Europe and America.

**PHOTOGRAPHER'S RULE BOOK** by Larry June. This book tells you how to get clear pictures the first time, use a filter, instruction on "cropping" for better emphasis, and shows you what you can do with an inexpensive camera. These and many other suggestions to add liveliness to your pictures to make them tell good stories. The illustrations all through the book, were made with inexpensive cameras under every day conditions.

**INSIGNIA OF THE SERVICE** by Paul Brown. The purchase of this book is to enable civilians to tell the rank and grade and branch of a man in uniform. It is probable that many minor changes in the wearing of the braids, insignia, etc., will be ordered.

**I HAVE LOVED ENGLAND** by Alice Duer Miller. This is primarily a book of photographs—it is illuminated on every page by the comments of Miss Miller. Some of the beautiful man made monuments that appear in these pictures have been sacrificed in the ruthless bombing England has undergone; others, perhaps, before this war is over, will also be lost. But implicit throughout this book is the sense that here is an England ageless and serene, undefeated and undefeatable.

**GENESEE FEVER** by Carl Carmer. To this first novel Mr. Carmer brings the charming style and the knowledge of history and folklore that have made his previous books so popular. *Genesee Fever* is the story of the aristocratic Charles Williamson, the pious universal friend, and the struggle between autocracy and democracy in the early days of Genesee county in New York state. The convincing historical background and the portrayal of the early settlers make this a vigorous novel.

**BRIGHT SCALPEL** by Elizabeth Seifert. After two years in China Jim Wyatt comes back to his home town, ill in body, still restless in spirit. As a young doctor he finds work to do there as his health improves, but also discovers some lack of honesty in medical practice. He fights for better conditions and the town's reactions to it makes a good story. Two girls attract him and Jim himself is a very likable young man.
