## 11 Buys of Tires, Tubes Authorized

Complying with instructions to make public certificates issued for purchase of new tires, Frances Lintott, secretary of the local tire rationing board, announced today that 11 purchases of tires and tubes so far have been authorized as follows: Clyde E. Palm, rural mail carrier; California Oregon Power company (2); utility; Douglas county sheriff, law enforcement; W. G. Owens, trucking; U. S. Bond, trucking; Conn brothers, trucking; Arthur Boyer, surveyor; C. E. Mitchell, Franklin Haines, Clarence Ingram, obsolete sizes (unrestricted).

Mrs. Lintott reports that two questions commonly asked of the board, together with rulings obtained are as follows: Q. Can an employee of a mining or manufacturing company who uses his car to travel to and from his plant or between plants of his company secure a certificate for tires? A. No. Q. A tire dealer has sold a tire and has guaranteed to replace it with a new tire if the original tire proved defective. Can the tire owner exchange a tire which proves defective for a new tire? A. No. If the person is entitled to an adjustment on the guarantee he should seek a monetary settlement.
