

RHS Hoopsters Lose to Ashland Lithians, 43 to 19

Playing against a strong team of tall, veteran sharpshooters from Ashland, the Roseburg high school Indians were swamped under a 43-to-19 score in the basketball game at the local gymnasium last night. Ashland, boasting two very outstanding stars, Jandreau and Provost, rang up 16 points before Johnny Ness broke through for Roseburg's initial basket which was not until after three minutes of play in the second quarter.

Ashland completely dominated play in the first half, running the score from 16 to 0 at the quarter to 24 to 5 at the half. Charley Jandreau was the sparkplug of the Ashland attack as he and Provost ringed the hoop from outside the Roseburg defense until they drew out the guards, then broke through to score from close in. Ashland dominated play off the backboards and showed exceptional ability at ball-hawking.

High point honors went to Jandreau with 17 counters, followed closely by Provost with 13. For Roseburg, John Ness, guard, led the scoring with 7 points. Ed Hughes, sole letterman on this year's squad, had six counters to his credit.

Victors Use Subs

Ashland's blistering first half attack slowed down during the second period as substitutes came into the game. In the last period the Indians held Ashland scoreless while making three points. Roseburg opened up with long range shots in the second half, after falling during the first two periods to break through the tight zone defense of the visitors. The long range shooting served to break up the Ashland defense and the Indians played the visitors on far more even terms.

Tension and inexperience on the part of the Indians was evident in the early stages of the game, but Coach Jim Davis expressed belief these faults will be corrected as the season advances and the players gain confidence.

Roseburg made only six field goals, as compared with 19 by Ashland, but showed superiority in tosses from the free throw line, making 7 out of 10 foul shots as compared with 5 out of 9 by Ashland. Twenty fouls were called during the game of which nine were against Roseburg.

Lee Wimberly, Roseburg forward, was slightly injured in a hard fall, but was able to return to the game a few minutes later. Coach Davis optimistic.

Coach Davis reported he was well satisfied with the team's showing, especially during the second half. He used a total of 10 players of whom four were sophomores. As only two players, Hughes and Ness, will be lost by graduation, Davis, who does not expect this year's team to begin showing its full power until late in the season, already is building up for what he expects will be a very good team next season.

Friday night of this week, the Indians will meet the Grants Pass Cavemen in what promises to be a close contest. Both teams have lost to Ashland, Grants Pass having been defeated 35 to 12. The scores would indicate Grants Pass and Roseburg to be about equal in playing ability. The game will be played at the senior high gymnasium, starting at 7:45 p. m., and will be preceded by a preliminary at 6:45 by the B squads of the two schools. Last night the Roseburg Bees were beaten 20 to 10 by the Yoncalla high school team.

Cougar Hoopsters Take OSC, 53-45

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 14.—(AP) The Washington State Cougars staved off a last half rally of a hard-fighting Oregon State team to win, 53-45, in northern division coast conference basketball play here last night.

The victory, second of the four-game Oregon field trip for the Cougars, was largely credited to Gale Bishop and Mark Gilberg, who led the attack and piled up the points necessary to stop the Oregonians.

The Cougars took an early lead and led at halftime, 24-20, but dropped behind for a moment in the face of a strong Oregon State attack in the second half. A comeback netted the Cougars six field goals and they took a 33-32 lead, never to be headed again.

John Mandic and Lew Beck threw a second scare into the Pullman boys with a six-point flurry midway in the second half but accurate throwing by Gilberg and Bishop put the game on ice.

Gilberg and Valenti, of O. S. C., tied for scoring honors with 14 points each.

Elks Home to Care for Evacuated Children

Exalted Ruler Adrian Fisher of Roseburg lodge of Elks announced today that he had received notice from James R. Nicholson, chairman of the Elks war commission, New York City, that preparations have been made to take care of Elks' children evacuated from danger zones at the Elks National home at Bedford, Va., should such a step become necessary.

At a meeting of the leaders of the Order of Elks held in New York City last week, plans were set up to raise a large fund to be operated by the Elks war commission which originally was appointed in Houston, Texas, in 1940 and known as the Elks national defense commission. The funds of the various projects of this commission will be financed through the voluntary contributions of the 500,000 members belonging to the 1400 lodges of the Order.

"In the last war," said Mr. Fisher, "more than two million dollars was raised by the Order for its war activities from its own membership and it is anticipated that an equal or larger sum will be raised by the Elks during the present war because of the order's increased strength in membership. Roseburg lodge will do its part in this national program."

Civilian Aircraft In West Oregon Ordered Grounded

SEATTLE, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Brig. Gen. Carlyle H. Wash, commanding the 2d interceptor command, yesterday grounded all civilian aircraft, with the exception of approved air lines, in western Washington and Oregon as a matter of "military necessity."

His order said classes already being trained in the official civilian pilot training schools would be permitted to complete their courses, but that no new students might be enrolled. As soon as present classes have finished training, the schools throughout the area will be closed.

The order is effective immediately.

However, operators may apply for specific military authority for one-way flights to transport aircraft out of the restricted area.

The prohibition applies to all offshore areas and to all of western Washington and Oregon bounded on the east by the 121st degree meridian, north of the 45th parallel, and by the 121st degree, 30 minute meridian south of the 45th parallel. The 121st meridian crosses Washington state just west of Cle Elum.

Since the outbreak of war, private flying has already been banned in western Washington from the Canadian border south to an east-west line a short distance south of Olympia.

Lice, Typhus Add To Woes of Nazis

BERN, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Germany, combatting an outbreak of typhus fever, recently has rushed hundreds of additional doctors and nurses to the eastern front and established an anti-epidemic center at Warsaw, the Berlin correspondent of the Swiss newspaper National Zeitung reported today.

A "battle against lice," the chief carrier of typhus, has resulted. Nazi soldiers, wearing heavy clothing for long periods without washing them, the newspaper said, have been beset with lice.

"The abnormal climate and weather conditions of the Russian winter not only necessitate care of clothing, food and shelter for the troops but increasing painstaking examination of health conditions," the dispatch said.

"Special measures have been taken against epidemics for which the danger is very great. In barracks and blockhouses there frequently are three to four times as many people crammed together as was the case on the western front."

"Army doctors say that toward the end of winter the fever curve usually rises steadily. Consequently, big centers for delousing have been created behind the front, manned by hundreds of doctors, specialists and chemists, the house being the most danger-

ous carrier of spotted typhus." Spotted typhus was reported in Swedish dispatches to have broken out some weeks ago in the Baltic states and in Polish areas, resulting in strict quarantines in some zones.

Asiatic cholera also had been reported from regions around the Ural mountains.
