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Metals, Machines and Men

EVEN as recently as 1917-18 no one disputed the Napoleonic maxim that armies travel on their stomachs. "Food will win the war" was one of the most familiar slogans of those days.

While food will always be highly important, it has ceased to occupy the No. 1 place as a strategic material. Armies still have to eat as much as ever, but they now travel on wheels and wings. It is the metals of which fighting machines are made that military and naval men are watching. The 1942 slogan will be "machines will win the war."

In respect to strategic mineral products, Nation's Business points out that America possesses an enormous advantage over Japan. We produce in a normal year 1,250,000,000 barrels of petroleum to 2,500,000 for the Japanese; 350,000,000 to 450,000,000 tons of coal compared with their 45,000,000; 50,000,000 tons of iron ore to Japan's 750,000; 500,000 tons of zinc to 45,000 for the empire of the rising (or is it a setting) sun.

But the advantage is not all with us. The Japanese have the edge in such items as tungsten, tin, magnesium and rubber. Talking into account the fact that no one knows how much of these vital materials Japan and the other Axis powers have stored up against this present need, there is obviously no ground for any confidence that Japan will quickly collapse. The Japanese people are known to be endured to hardship. They have been through the test of privation and their needs are few and easily satisfied. These are stoic qualities that Americans of this generation have yet to learn, but we must and will become apt pupils.

AT the time when Mussolini was handing the Italian people over to the German overlords by hitching onto the Axis, it was loudly proclaimed in Latin Italy that the Italian people were Aryans all the time, thus making them blood kin to that pure Nordic racial strain which is characteristically "as blond as Hitler, as slender as Goering, and as tall as Goebbels."

Now that Mussolini has linked his people with the fate of Japan, we presume the next step will be to prove by devious ethnological processes, that the Italians are really Orientals after all.

You smile. Absurd? No more absurd than the whole racial superiority doctrine which is as close as Fascism can come to having a rational philosophy.

Your Federal Income Tax

No. 11
Returns of Incomes of
Decedents

A return is required to be filed for a deceased individual if the gross income to the date of death is \$750 or over, and the individual was single, or married and not living with husband or wife for any part of the taxable year, or if the gross income to the date of death is equal to, or in excess of the credit for personal exemption (not including credit as head of family or for dependent), and the individual was married and living with husband or wife for all or any part of the taxable year. The return for a decedent must include all items of income and deductions accrued up to the date of death, regardless of the fact that the decedent may have kept his books on a cash receipts and disbursements basis or did not keep books.

The income return of a decedent for the year in which he died is considered a return for 12 months and not for a fractional part of a year, and is due on the 15th day of the third month following the close of the taxable year during which the decedent died. After his appointment and qualification, an executor or administrator may immediately file a return for the decedent without waiting for the close of the taxable year.

Keep Baseball On Go During War, Roosevelt Urges

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, a baseball fan from way back, urged today that the national sport be kept going during the war.

This was his personal rather than official point of view, expressed in a letter today to Kene-saw Mountain Landis, baseball high commissioner, who had written on January 14 inquiring what the president had in mind regarding continuance of professional baseball in wartime.

Mr. Roosevelt pointed out that fewer people would be unemployed, that the people would be working harder and longer hours than ever before, and hence should have an opportunity for recreation taking their minds off their work.

He suggested, too, that there be more night games because they would give day workers a chance to see an occasional contest.

Mr. Roosevelt said that 300 teams, using 5,000 to 6,000 players, would be a definite recreational asset to at least 20,000,000 people and in his judgment this was thoroughly worthwhile.

I. C. C. Disclaims Authority in S. P. Train Cancelling

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 16.—(AP)—The I. C. C., in a letter replying to a personal telegram protesting discontinuance of passenger train service by the Southern Pacific railroad between Ashland and Dunsmuir, Calif., has disclaimed authority in the matter.

However the I. C. C. has made no reply to the formal protest which followed the telegram, said Niel R. Allen, attorney who was asked by Josephine and Jackson county officials to draw up their joint protest. The inter-county committee today advised Ormond Bean, Oregon P. U. C. commissioner now in the east, that they will require a formal hearing on discontinuance of the Shasta between Grants Pass and San Francisco last Sunday.

"The supervisory power of this commission under the law of operation of passenger trains is very limited and covers only matters dealing with the safety feature. No authority is vested with the commission to compel frequency of passenger train service by the railroads."

"It is suggested that you may care to refer your problem to your state railroad commission, who may have authority over matters involving the frequency or adequacy of passenger train service."
