Four home nursing classes have already been completed here and numerous Roseburg women have expressed their desire for further classes, so that more women will be given the instruction in this work.

Prominent nurses in this city have been secured to act as instructors of the three classes. Only 24 women will be registered in each class and the classes will begin as soon as the registrations are completed.

Women of the community are registering this week for the class. The class, under the auspices of the American Red Cross, is in charge of Mrs. John Edwards, chairman, Mrs. John Edwards and Mrs. W. O. Waggoner with Miss Ruth Squier, registered nurse, as instructor.

During war time, when there is considerable shortage of doctors and registered nurses in towns and cities, it is most urgent that as many women in the home know what to do in case of accidents and sickness, so the home nursing classes have been offered by the Red Cross as a means of preparing the American women for their task during the months and years ahead. The classes have been held all over the county and are also being held in every state of the union as a means of preparedness for the period of the war. The Oakland committee is urging every woman in the community, who can possibly attend the classes, to do so and be present at the first meeting next Monday, January 19, at two o'clock at the parish house.
