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The 1942 "Horse" Thief

NO longer simple unnoticed items of ordinary life, the tires on your automobile are now important possessions. They are cared for, guarded against abuse, and conserved.

Tires have, in fact, become so valuable to the owners thereof, that the attention of petty thieves has been attracted to them. This information is brought to us with obvious signs of genuine concern by a representative of one of the large insurance companies.

Tire thieves now, however, are no longer listed as mere petty thieves. They may still be petty, but the crime of stealing tires is not any longer so considered. The heaviest penalties in the book are being levied against tire thieves—and properly so.

Remember what they did to horse thieves a generation or so ago? In those days a horse thief was the lowest form of animal life. They seldom wasted good bullets on the varmints—merely used a rope which could be later salvaged and used elsewhere. Anyone who steals a tire now is a reptile even lower than the old time horse thief, and for the same reason—transportation is a vital need in any generation.

But every auto owner has a simple means easily at his command that will discourage tire thieves and, in case of loss, will enable recovery of his property. Every automobile and truck tire is numbered with a serial number cast into the carcass of the tire. Just write the make and serial numbers of your tires on a slip of paper and file it with your valuables. You can then claim your property wherever it may be. Better take this simple precaution today.

WE note in our advertising columns the first evidence of the passing of the auto as a means of transportation and the transition back to the horse-and-buggy days. Perhaps we face numerous other adjustments but at least the hitching post now takes its place along side the parking lot at one roadside place.

forces for a counter-offensive, and are preparing for it.

FROM Tokyo today comes a tale that a Jap fleet has appeared off Subic Bay. That, if it should prove to be true, would indicate that the Japs are trying to land troops to take MacArthur in the rear.

It would be a reliable hint that they have found his little army too tough for a frontal attack.

PROOF of Japanese air and naval superiority in Malaya is indicated pretty clearly by the method of their advance down the long, narrow peninsula leading to Singapore.

Time again they have outflanked the British defense lines

by sea, landing troops in the REAR of the defenders and compelling them to fall back.

(DON'T take these brighter spots in the Pacific war news so seriously as to jump to the conclusion that the Japs have shot their bolt and are slowing down. No such conclusion is justified as yet. The Japs got there "fastest with the mostest men," and it will take time to overcome their setbacks.)

In the Philippines, the Japs posed at first as the deliverer of the Filipinos. It didn't seem to "take."

They're now decreeing the death penalty for anyone who injures a Jap soldier or civilian. If the guilty individual can't be found they seize TEN hostages for each Jap injury. (If you've been reading the news from conquered Europe, you know where they got that idea.)

The point is that the Filipinos AREN'T going over to the Japs. Instead, they are risking torture and death to oppose them.

OFFENSES punishable by death under the Jap order include disturbing the peace, violation of military orders, espionage, concealment of requisitioned goods and circulation of rumors concerning the Japanese forces.

EVERY time the Japs have attacked MacArthur they have lacked the advantage of surprise. Always they have found the Americans and Filipinos awaiting them in previously prepared positions.

That indicates that the civilian population is spying on the Japs and getting word of their every movement to the American forces.

LITTLE news from Cairo indicates that not much progress has been made by the British in north Africa. There have been reports for several days that German and Italian air strength is increasing—indicating that some of the planes Hitler has pulled away from the Russian front are arriving in Africa.

The Russians are straining every nerve to close their pincers around large German forces. On the success or failure of these efforts much will depend.

Roseburg Indians Post 24-20 Win Over Grants Pass

Closely-Fought Basketball Game Decided on Margin of Pair of Field Goals

The Roseburg high school Indians scaped the Grants Pass Cavemen, 24 to 20, last night at the senior high gymnasium, to break into the win column for the first time this season. The game was a thriller for the spectators as the Indians fought from behind during the first half and from a one-point deficit at half-time to achieve their four-point margin of victory.

Roseburg was held scoreless during the first period but came back strong in the second quarter and were trailing by one point, 11 to 10, at the half. Gaining momentum as the game was renewed, the Indians stepped in to a quick lead as the third period opened and from then on were out in front to stay.

For the Indians, John Ness and Ward Cummings turned in excellent games in their defensive

Cummings Top Scorer

Grants Pass was playing without the services of Nell Schrimpf, high scoring guard and ex-Roseburg player, who was unable to make the trip due to illness. Johnny Gray, diminutive forward, provided the spark of the Grants Pass attack as he scored 11 points to take high honors. For Roseburg, Cummings was high scorer with six points, which included four free throws and one field goal. He connected on every gift toss.

Grants Pass made repeated substitutions in an attempt to halt the Indian drive but were unable to find a combination which could overcome the Roseburg lead. The margin of victory was two field goals as each team converted eight free throws.

The Indians are now working toward next week's bill, when they will journey to Medford and Ashland for games Friday and Saturday.

In the preliminary last night the Roseburg Bees were beaten 25 to 11 by the Grants Pass Bees. The game provided many thrills for the early-arriving onlookers.

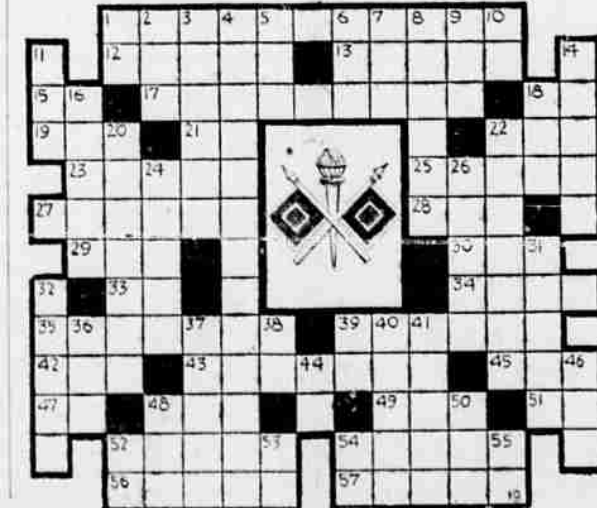

Robinson Defeats Zivic as Bout Is Halted in Tenth

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Fritz Zivic has no complaints today about the speed and "Sunday shots" with which Ray Robinson whipped him, but Fritz and a lot of other folks are mighty curious over what made Referee Arthur Donovan stop the fight.

Donovan stepped in with Zivic on the floor in the tenth round last night in Madison Square garden, and gave Robinson a technical knockout victory.

Possibly the most amazed man in the place was Luke Carney, Fritz's manager, who declared today that Donovan's decision was "too fast." Sid Carney: "At least, my man was entitled to be counted over."

Now, there's no denying that Harlem's skinny hammer was considerably out in front up to that point in the rip-roaring 12-round battle to decide who would get a shot at Red Cochrane's welterweight championship, possibly next month. The Associated Press score card gave the negro five of the nine completed rounds. What's more, he floored Fearless Fritz with a looping overhand right for a nine count in the ninth session.

But when Ray let go both barrels and dropped the Pittsburgh playboy early in the tenth, Fritz was no more hurt than you'd be if you ran around a corner and bumped into another fellow. Like the brainy boxer he's always been, Zivic was fighting on taking a count—and a rest.

But Donovan stepped in and called it off after 31 seconds of that round even as Zivic was struggling to his feet. It marked only the second time in 10 years of trouncing with the thumpers that a knockout was scored against Zivic.

Fritz needed no help to walk to his corner, almost in tears from what he and a lot of booing customers thought was an unfair finish.

"Gee," he told his handlers, "when I was just about slaughtering Henry Armstrong and taking his title away a year ago, Donovan wasn't in such a hurry to call a technical knockout. I wasn't hurt here, so why should he do it to me?"

Huskies Defeat U. of O. Hoopsters

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 17.—(AP)—The University of Washington captured its third consecutive game in the northern division of the Pacific Coast Basketball league last night, 60-34, from Oregon.

The Huskies outscored the Oregonians and led almost from the outset. They were in front 33-16 at the half and continued outscoring their rivals at that margin throughout the last period.

So badly did the Washingtonians outplay his first stringers and their alternates that Coach Howard Hobson ran in a string of inexperienced sophomores early in the second half. The recruits were no match for the visitors in basketball but they fought for the ball with such zest that the game almost turned into a free-for-all. Thirty-eight fouls were called, the highest of the season in the northern division.

Sophomore Doug Ford led the scoring for Washington with 15 points. He made six field goals. Bobby Lind and Norm Dalthorp each got 10 points.

Paul Jackson scored seven points for the Webfoots.

The victory was Washington's first over Oregon in Eugene since 1937.

The teams play again tonight.

Time for Filing Returns of Individuals

Income tax returns of citizens are required by law to be made on or before the 15th day of the third month following the close of the taxable year, which for most individuals is the calendar year. Since March 15, 1942, will fall on a Sunday, such returns for the calendar year 1941 must be filed on or before midnight of Monday, March 16, 1942.

Returns by nonresident alien individuals must be made on or before the 15th day of the sixth month after the close of the fiscal year, or on or before June 15,

1942, for the calendar year 1941. If placed in the mail, the returns should be posted in ample time to reach the collector's office, under ordinary handling of the mails, on or before the due date. The envelope should bear proper postage and be addressed to the "Collector of Internal Revenue" at the correct address in the district where the taxpayer's legal residence or principal place of business is located. If he has neither, the return should be mailed to the Collector of Internal Revenue at Baltimore, Md.

The regulations grant an extension of time for filing returns of income up to and including the 15th day of the sixth month following the close of the taxable year in the case of American citizens residing or traveling abroad, including persons in the military or naval service on duty outside the United States. In all such cases an affidavit is required to be attached to the return stating the cause of the delay in filing, and taxpayers who take advantage of this extension of time will be charged with interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum on the first installment of the tax from the original due date until paid.

Shortage of Cans For Food Looms

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—OPM is cooking up some bad news for brides—no more dinners out of cans.

If Mrs. Newlywed is smart, she will rustle up a cook book and start studying because there's an order in the works prohibiting the use of tin for packaging virtually everything that can be marketed satisfactorily in some other type of container or in no container at all.

Among the casualties, it was reported, will be such old reliables as pork and beans, spaghetti, canned meat, and beer—not to mention dog food. In recent years, the dog food output has averaged around 650,000,000 one-pound cans annually.

The theory of the pending order is further conservation of dwindling tin supplies. It was understood that the can manufacturers would have supplies cut about 50 per cent upon issuance of the order and would be prohibited from using the metal for a long list of items after March 31.
