## Farm Loan Assn. Directors Confer At Meeting Here

Directors of the five national farm loan associations of Douglas, Coos and Curry counties, which make up the Roseburg group office, met in Roseburg, Thursday, January 15, with representatives of the Federal Land bank of Spokane to discuss association operations.

Here from Spokane were C. C. Rowan, assistant to the president of the Spokane bank, and Arnold Anderson, regional manager for the bank's affairs in Oregon.

Plans for annual membership meeting of the associations were discussed. The annual meeting for the coast and Coos bay associations will be held at Coquille Monday, February 23, and the annual meetings of the Umpqua, Oakland and Myrtle Creek associations will be held in Roseburg Saturday, February 21. "Because 1942 marks the 25th anniversary of the farm loan system, it is appropriate that these meetings should review the system's accomplishments in the past quarter of a century," Rowan said. "In the light of our experience, we also will want to consider the possibilities for greater service to agriculture in the future."

"The present war gives national farm loan associations a great opportunity for service in helping to forestall land inflation that did so much harm to agriculture and the nation after the last war. Maintenance of realistic land values will keep agriculture economically healthy and strong to do its job in the present war effort and meet its responsibilities in the readjustment period to follow the war."

"The associations are steadily growing in importance in their own communities as more and more responsibilities for the administration of the farm loan system are transferred to them, and leadership in this anti-inflationary movement is rightfully theirs by virtue of their volume of membership and farm loan business."

The Roseburg group of associations serve 760 farmers who are using over \$3,000,000 of credit through the local groups and the land bank commissioner. Directors who attended the meeting were:

## Youthful Killer Loses Bravado as He Goes to Chair

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—(AP)—"It had it coming."

Those were the last words of a teary-eyed, repentant 19-year-old orphan before his electrocution early today for murdering a policeman, whose death the youth once passed off with "that's his tough luck."

Bernard Sawicki, a doorstep foundling at 3, who boasted he played with guns in fifth grade and became known as "Knifey" as a child, killed four persons during a spree of robbery and gunfire last summer. He was convicted for the slaying of Policeman Charles J. Speaker, and his response to the death sentence was:

"To hell with you; I can take it."

Last night he took four mouthfuls of a steak dinner, pushed the food aside, knelt with a priest and sobbed as he prayed.

The youth was the youngest white convict to die in the chair since Illinois adopted that form of penalty in 1927.

Last night he wrote the policeman's widow, addressing her as "Dear Mother Speaker," and saying:

"I know I am no good and I hope you forgive me for what I have done to your husband. If I knew then what I know now, this tragedy never would have happened."

## Fire Kills Three; Stork Leaves One Survivor

SEATTLE, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Mrs. Kasper Peter Mellang, 26, died early today without knowing that she had given birth to a son a few hours after her husband had carried her from their blazing home in White Center, a south side suburb. She was not told that Mellang and their 2½ year old son, James Henry, perished in the flames.

Hospital attendants said the newborn infant had a good chance to survive.

The body of her 38-year-old husband and her son were discovered in the ruins of the suburban home after Mellang carried his wife from the blazing structure. Neighbors said they believed Mellang was trapped by the flames when he dashed back inside the house in a futile attempt to save his son.
