Exiled Anti-Nazi Writer to Speak At Roseburg School

Dr. Martin Hall, German journalist, exiled from his native land because of anti-Nazi activities, will speak at Roseburg Junior high school at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday, R. R. Brand, principal of the school, announced today. Dr. Hall was scheduled to speak here a week ago, but, due to illness, was prevented from carrying out his schedule. His itinerary has been rearranged making it possible for him to appear here at an evening meeting, which is expected to be a more favorable time for adult listeners.

Dr. Hall is sponsored by the National Assemblies, an organization formed to provide educational programs for schools.

"We have heard high praise of Dr. Hall and his message from people who have attended his lectures, and we believe Roseburg listeners will be greatly benefited by attendance at this program," Principal Brand said today. "He is being brought here as a part of our effort to contribute to the national defense program by giving students and the general public a clearer picture of conditions."

Dr. Hall was one of Germany's outstanding journalists, but because of his activities in opposition to the national socialist party he was forced to flee from that country. He spent considerable time in other European nations, particularly France and England, and then came to the United States. He has applied for citizenship in this country and has received his first papers.
