Many Would Adopt Baby Bereaved by Tragedy

SEATTLE, Jan. 20.—(AP)—More than 500 couples had applied today for permission to adopt Gordon Mellang, prematurely born four days ago shortly before his mother died, burned and shocked by a fire which destroyed her home and in which her husband died in a vain attempt to rescue his step-son, John

Henry, 21 years old.

Mrs. Mellang had selected the baby's Christian name but she died, after a Caesarian operation, without knowing of his birth or of the deaths of her husband, Peter Mellang, and her son by a previous marriage.

Mrs. Mellang's mother, Mrs. Adna W. Smith, said she desired to take the baby as her legal ward but to have him retain his father's surname because Mellang, a barber, "died a hero" after carrying Mrs. Mellang to safety.
