

Navy Now Offers Enlistees Wider Opportunities

The expansion program of the U. S. navy affords a wide range of opportunity for men who desire to be of service to their country and at the same time obtain education and experience which will be of value to them in later life, according to Benny Hall, recruiting officer.

Mr. Hall arrived here Tuesday and will remain through Thursday to accept enlistments in the navy. Arrangements have been made whereby a recruiting officer will visit Roseburg Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week. Headquarters are maintained at the chamber of commerce office.

The greatest need at present, Hall reports, is for men to train for naval aviation and for men with some degree of experience in radio operation.

Men are wanted for both ground and flying duty in aviation, he reports. Men who successfully complete ground school work can be accepted for pilot training. Men who hold licenses as amateur radio operators and even those who are not licensed but have had technical experience can secure ratings in the communications department.

Age Limits Top Now 50.

The navy now can accept men from 17 to 50 years of age in all departments, Hall reports. Married men can enlist providing they procure waivers of dependents.

A large number of young men who plan to study medicine recently have been enlisted in the hospital corps, he reports. The navy course in pre-medicine and pharmacy gives not only the theory of a regular pre-medicine course, but also provides practical experience, particularly in pharmacy and minor surgery. Such training greatly aids the student in his future studies for his degree in medicine. Many pharmacists and hospital experts, Hall reports, have entered highly paid jobs in civil life after leaving the navy.

Applicants, wherever possible, are requested to show a certificate of proof of birth at the time of applying for enlistment, but it is not necessary that this proof be shown if not immediately available. In the event the applicant has some difficulty in establishing the required proof, he will be given assistance by the recruiting service, Hall states.

Assistant State Defense Coordinator Appointed

SALEM, Jan. 21.—(AP)—James D. Olson, Portland, former information director for the state game commission, today was appointed assistant state defense coordinator by Governor Sprague. He will serve under Jerrold Owen, state defense coordinator.

Olson has assisted Owen for the past month, having been granted an indefinite leave of absence by the game commission.

Olson is a veteran newspaperman, having worked as a reporter on both Portland newspapers, the San Francisco Call-Bulletin, and other California newspapers. He is a member of Portland post No. 1, American Legion.

Participant in Lottery Draws Jail Sentence

SEATTLE, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Arthur W. Kane, a Superior, Wis., railroad clerk, was sentenced to serve 11 months in the King county jail for his part in the operations of the International Transportation and Communication Mutual association, a lottery, Federal Judge John C. Cohen ruled yesterday.

A second defendant, Edward F. Schmitt, railroad ticket taker of Mandan, N. D., was given a suspended sentence of six months and placed on five years probation after he pleaded an illness which might cause his death at any time. Both had pleaded guilty to the government charges.

Five others charged in the same case will be tried as soon as a jury now being selected is completed.

John E. Allen, Native Of Oakland, Passes On

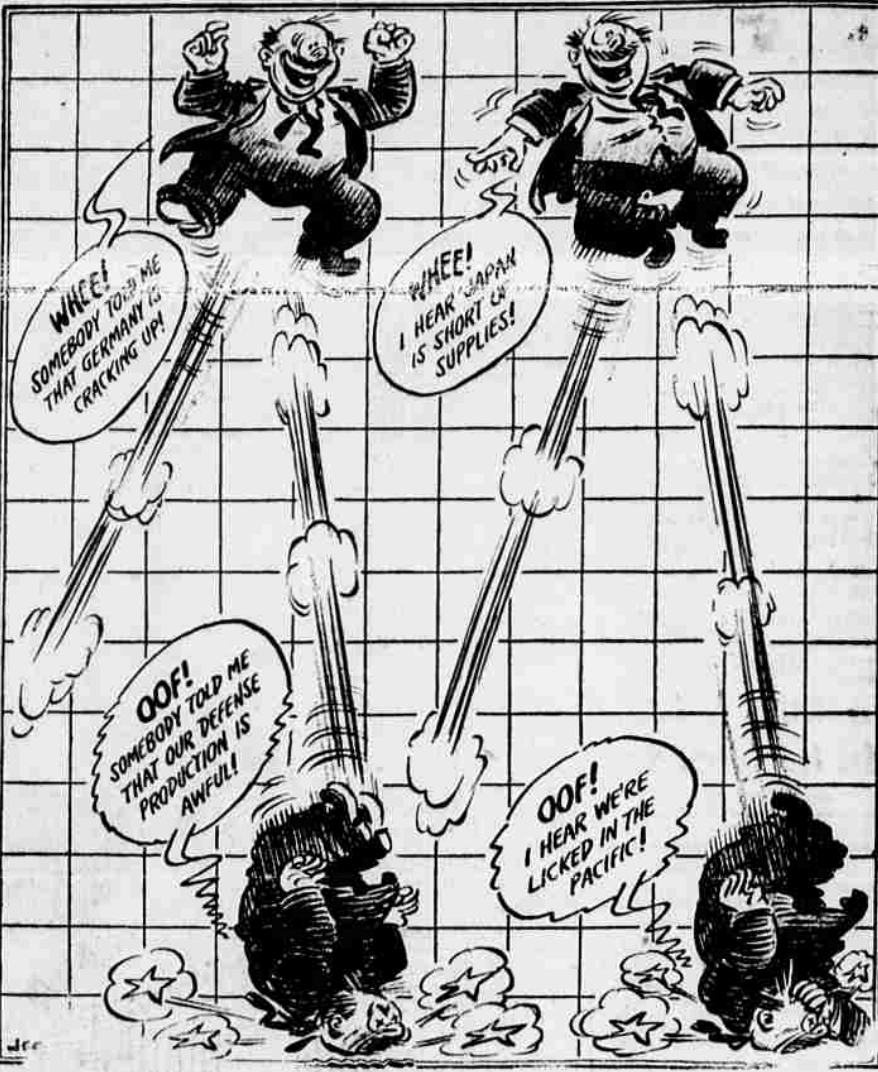

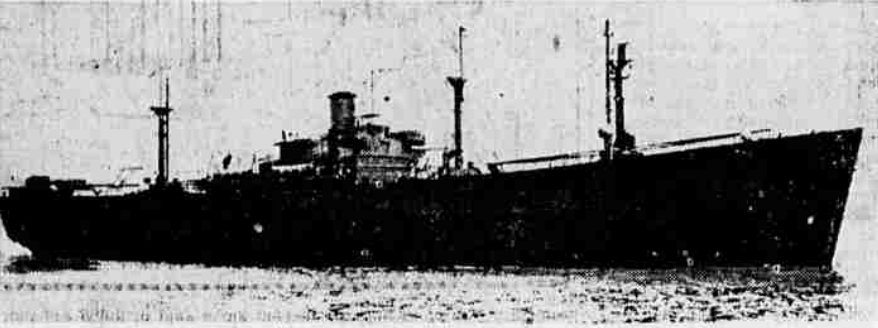
The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral home and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

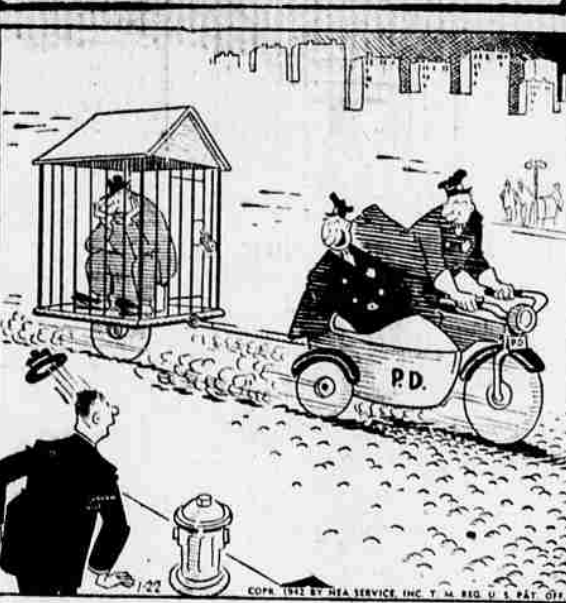


Liberty Ship Makes Her Maiden Voyage

Bond Pledge Drive In Douglas Meets Warm Responses

Armed with pledge cards and boundless enthusiasm, 150 workers in Roseburg and hundreds of workers throughout the county Tuesday started a house-to-house canvass to enlist "dollars for defense," a part of the country-wide United States defense-savings pledge campaign. Owen is the nation's lead-off state in the campaign. The minute men making these calls report warm and welcome receptions in virtually every home visited, County Chairman H. O. Pargeter, reported today.

The most frequently asked question was whether or not

Douglas county citizens who have signed up for payroll plans of bond buying should sign pledge cards as well. The answer is that they should sign. "Everyone signs pledge cards to indicate to the government the particular authorized agency through which bonds are being purchased. It is a canvass of every man, woman and child in Douglas county," Pargeter said. "Through this campaign we are given the opportunity again to pledge our allegiance to our flag by pledging to buy defense bonds and stamps on a regular basis. This is the only way to win the war and to indicate through which payroll savings plan we are doing our part. "Subscriptions will be left entirely to the discretion of the person solicited. Minute men will offer no gratuitous advice, but will be sufficiently well informed on the defense bond and stamp pro-

gram to answer any questions. All minute men have been instructed to proceed on the theory that families already have made up their minds as to the extent of their participation." General Howard Stuckey, city chairman, states that the campaign workers will concentrate on Roseburg housewives during the morning and afternoon hours but will call back again up until 9:30 in the evening to secure bond pledges from heads of families. General Stuckey further suggests that people leave their porch lights on so that numbers may be seen readily and in this way will assist the solicitor who is compelled to make a return call in the evening.
