

Warning Given to Auto Owners on Theft of Tires

A warning to car owners to protect themselves against theft of tires was given today in a statement by the Pacific coast division of the National Automobile Theft Bureau. The statement, directed to car owners and containing suggestions for protection is as follows:

All districts in the Pacific coast and inter-mountain territory are suffering a severe epidemic of automobile stripping. As time passes, and the purchase of automobile equipment, particularly tires and batteries, is further restricted by the government, this epidemic will increase in intensity.

Law enforcement officials are powerless to cope with this situation, without the whole-hearted cooperation of the automobile owners. This situation will hit the owner of the insured car, the same as it will hit the owner of the uninsured car. Insurance companies are as powerless to purchase tires and batteries as are private individuals; so, if an insured car is stripped, the insurance company cannot purchase replacement equipment. Right now it is very difficult to purchase recapped tires and impossible to purchase new tires.

A few don'ts for the car owner: Don't park in poorly lighted or isolated districts, on streets in residential districts at night, if avoidable, leave car at any time without locking it completely, take precautions for a day or two and then grow careless. This is for the duration.

Important precautions to take: Make a memorandum of the make and numbers of your present tires and keep it until your tires are worn out; never leave your car at any time before locking it completely; lock your private garage at night. If two cars are observed at street curb or off any highway, where the drivers seem to be working on them, endeavor to jot down license numbers and report circumstance to nearest law enforcement agency. Thieves always use an extra car in which to transport stolen equipment.

If offered equipment by any one other than a reputable dealer, use your head by getting all possible information concerning the seller, and reporting the circumstances immediately.

Tires cannot be identified and the thieves cannot be prosecuted, unless the owner can furnish the serial numbers of such tires.

The police cannot watch each of the thousands of cars that are in use, and so it is strictly up to the owner to take all necessary precautions. In protecting his car, he is strictly on his own. The war has added hundreds of new duties to all peace officers and they simply will not be responsible for the job of watching parked cars. You insured car owners remember that your insurance company is in no better position than you are to buy and replace stolen equipment.

Mr. and Mrs. Rodney Smith made a trip to Myrtle Creek Wednesday evening when Mr. Smith had dental work done.

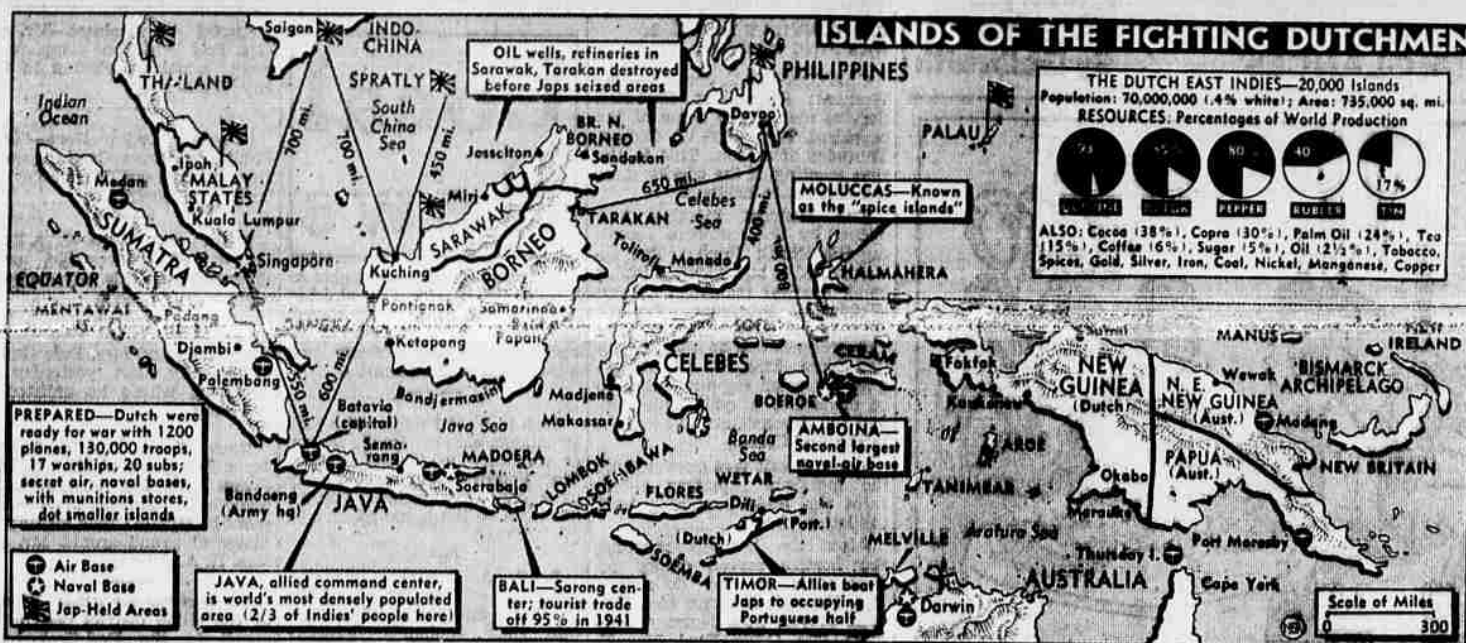

Recent amendments have been made to the tire rationing regulations so that all persons holding priority ratings must apply to the local boards for certificates of purchase the same as everyone else. Under the rationing rules no local board is permitted to issue more than 75 per cent of its monthly quota during the first three weeks of that month, so the Roseburg board still has its full quota for the last week in January and necessary tires will be granted from this quota.
