Oregon Leaders in Bond Sale Campaign Listed

PORTLAND, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Acting administrator Ray Conway said today that early returns from the state savings campaign showed heaviest pledges in Klamath, Hood River, Columbia and Multnomah counties.

Klamath county's 40,000 residents were asked to sign pledges to buy defense bonds and stamps at usual polling places, and 12,000 responded, Conway said.

Oregon's campaign started a week ago, 20 days ahead of the other states. Conway said treasury Secretary Morgenthau has requested an outline of this state's campaign plans.

Oregon to Join in U. S. Daylight Saving Plan

SALEM, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Governor Sprague began work today on a proclamation which will place Oregon on daylight saving time, probably at 11 p. m. on February 8. The proclamation will conform with a federal law advancing clocks one hour in federal activities and interstate commerce.
