

R. H. S. Hoopsters Prepare to Battle Grants Pass Next

Roseburg high basketball team resumed practice tonight after a two-day rest to recuperate from its strenuous southern tour last week-end. Coach Davis expressed great pleasure in the performance of the Indians last week. The regular season is shown by their victories over Medford, 29-27, and Ashland, 30-29, were very pleasing—after the slow early season start which they made. They appear to have found themselves now and are out for the title in dead earnest. Although the scores indicate close games, the Medford clash was almost a rout throughout, and only a late rally by Medford made a real contest. In the Ashland game the Indians had to come from behind to defeat the overconfident Lithians but they demonstrated their ability to continue a fast pace on two consecutive nights.

Grants Pass Next

The team will now start preparing for this week's game with Grants Pass this Friday at Grants Pass. The Cammen have yet to win a game this year but they have shown some improvement in recent games. Against Ashland the Cammen were beaten by but four points, 34-30, last week, after Ashland had defeated them 35-11 earlier in the year. This would seemingly indicate an improvement in the Grants Pass attack although Medford's easy victory over the Cammen last Saturday, 40 to 27, wasn't too promising. The Cammen have been playing their recent games without the services of Neil Schrimpf, high-scoring guard and ex-Roseburg player, who has been sick, but if he returns their attack will be greatly bolstered. Although the game would appear a "breather," Roseburg can well afford to profit by the mistake Ashland made last week in underestimating their opposition. Nothing can be sure in basketball races like this one.

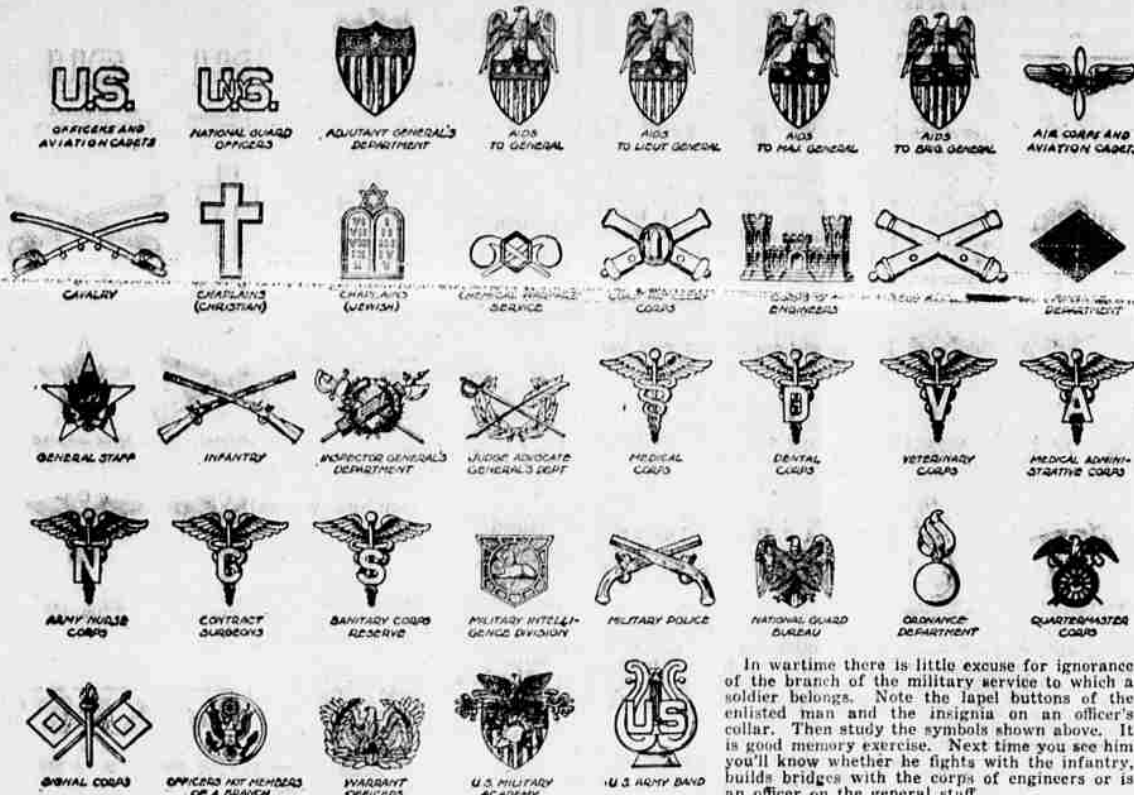

Study This Army Collar Insignia and Improve Your Military I.Q.



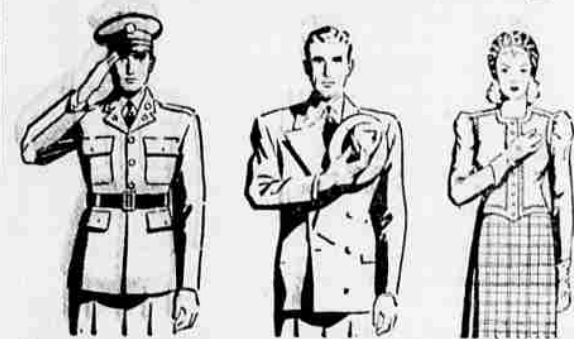

Every Patriotic American Salutes His Nation's Flag



During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag, or when the flag is passing in a parade or in a review, all persons present should face the flag, stand at attention and salute.

Those present in uniform should render the right hand salute. Those men not in uniform should remove their headgear.

with the right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart.

Women should salute by placing the right hand over the heart. The salute to the flag in a moving column is rendered as the flag approaches the spectator and is held until it has passed.

Fruit Assn. Seeks Aliens' Internment

BELLAIR, Fla., Jan. 26.—(AP)—The United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable association has asked for immediate internment of all enemy aliens in Arizona, California, Oregon and Washington to forestall violence between Japanese and Filipino produce farm labor on the Pacific coast.

The association adopted a resolution which also called on the treasury department to impound all funds and business properties owned by the aliens in the west coast states.

"We feel that, unless such steps are taken promptly and effectively, the efforts of state and local law enforcement officers to maintain peace and order may be unavailing, which would undoubtedly react unfavorably toward our own nationals who are now interned in axis countries," the resolution said.

"Because no more than 10 per cent of fresh fruits and vegetables shipped in interstate commerce from the four states mentioned are produced by Japanese or other alien enemies, such internment will not jeopardize in any way the essential food supplies of the United States."

Horse and Buggy Days' Return in U. S. Improbable; Bicycles Adapted Only to Short-Distance Traveling

WASHINGTON—The potential crisis in motor transportation in civilian life is giving rise to a lot of balderdash.

The idea that we are going to return really to the horse and buggy days, for example, is some of it. Naturally, with a shortage of tires, trucks and cars, some trucking and delivery companies who can adopt Old Dobbin to

The use of horses for getting about and for hauling in farm and small communities also will increase. But if just that went to anything like the limits of its possibilities all over the country, the horse market would be as empty as the barn with the open door.

Horse Supply Inadequate

One government expert told me recently that it would take about ten years to breed the nation's horse population back to what it was in the buckboard era. Even if a sufficient increase could be developed in a sufficient time to do any good, there still would be the problem of reviving the manufacture of carriages and harness.

Any demand for these in great quantities would necessitate virtually new industries, with a demand for new machine tools and new craftsmanship. There still would be the problem of priorities.

Bicycles Only Part Answer

Another bit of fallacious reasoning is that the nation is going to take to bicycle wheels overnight. Here again, it goes without saying that in some instances where distances are short, a bicycle might help a lot. As an auxiliary vehicle for short runs, it could be made to go far towards saving the family jalopy.

But to consider the facts puts another face on it. According to the National Safety Council, there now are about 8,000,000 bicycles in the country. The production from the 12 manufacturers in the

LONG BEACH, Calif., Jan. 27.—(AP)—Sixty Pearl harbor widows have applied for jobs in an airplane plant with the motto "keep 'em flying to avenge our husbands' deaths."

The widows and a gold star mother took aptitude tests yesterday for positions at Lockheed and Vega aircraft corps. Navy chaplain J. E. Johnson said there are 160 Pearl harbor widows here and he expects more to apply for jobs.

Paul M. Kenefick, in charge, said tests "showed that these women as a group were far superior to those who have contacted us at our regular employment offices."

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Coach Stiner Of O. S. C. Aides Get Boosts in Salary

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 27.—(AP)—Rose bowl pay lifts can't today to Oregon State College Coach Lon Stiner and members of his staff.

The state board of higher education voted to offer Stiner, whose 1941 eleven trounced Duke University 20-16 in the transplanted Rose bowl game at Durham, N.C., a long-term contract, calling for \$7000 a year.

The board also approved \$2,000 special pay to be paid within six months for preparing the team for the Rose bowl trip and game. Stiner's present contract, which expires at the end of this school year, carries a \$6600 annual salary.

Members of his staff got raises up to \$480 per year.
