Douglas Shares In Surfacing Old Road to Coos

Douglas county is cooperating with Coos county in surfacing the old Coos Bay road, by way of Reston and Brewster valley, to provide a route for evacuation of civilian population of the Coos Bay area in the event of an invasion of that section of Oregon. County Judge Dave Busenbark announced today. The county is spreading about 5,000 yards of gravel on the road from the Wilson place westward to the county line, a distance of about four miles. The Coos county court has authorized a large graveling job to put the road in shape for use in that county.

Members of the Coos county court recently came to Roseburg to secure cooperation from Douglas county, pointing out that in the event necessity should demand civilian evacuation it would be necessary to use the road. The existing main highways, it was stated, would be of necessity kept open for movement of troops and military supplies. By making the parallel route available, it would be possible, it was stated, to move large bodies of civilian population without interfering with troop movements.

The route was recently graded and otherwise improved by the CCC company located at Sitkum, but no surfacing was included on that project, which provided only for summer use. The work now in progress will make utilization of the road possible at all times.

Nazi Agents In N. Y. Accused of Propaganda Plot

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The German high command and their agents in New York city were accused in a federal indictment of dumping plundered loot and spoils of war in United States markets, the proceeds to be used to finance propaganda work in North and South America.

A New York corporation, its president, and three other individuals were named in the conspiracy indictment.

Those indicated were the Pioneer Import corporation; Werner von Clemm, its president, said by federal agents to be a cousin of the wife of German Foreign Minister von Ribbentrop; Carl von Clemm, Werner's twin brother, said by authorities to be a German emissary in Italy; Ernest Cremer, manager of the Diamond Control office, a regulatory body established by the nazis in the low countries following their occupation, and Carlos Hoepfner, European vice-president of Pioneer corporation and believed to be now in Germany.

Named as co-conspirators, but not as defendants, were "persons constituting the high command of the German army," members and partners of the International Mortgage Handelsellschaft G. M. B. H., European purchasing agency for Pioneer corporation; and "persons constituting the Diamond control office of the German army in Antwerp."

Railway Workers Force Ouster of Alien Japs

SEATTLE, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Declining to work with 12 alien Japanese laborers, about 150 men employed at the Northern Pacific Railway co., car shops here staged a 42-minute sit-down strike today, returning to their labors only when the Japanese were sent home.

Yesterday noon, 65 employees of the N. P. roundhouse at Auburn, south of here, drafted an ultimatum giving the road until Thursday noon to discharge three alien Japanese workers, under threat of a sit-down strike.
