NOW for the better news.

In the Strait of Macassar, separating the island of Borneo from the island of Celebes, the Japs have been learning this same lesson of naval weakness.

They apparently undertook to convey a big force of transports into the heart of the Dutch East Indies for an all-out attack.

Accounts of their losses vary somewhat—which is easily understandable in view of restricted communications and the confusion of battle.

At any rate, the Japs have received a serious setback which will force them to change their whole plan of attack.

DISPATCHES indicate that the Japs effected landings in both Borneo and Celebes, but with REDUCED FORCES.

IN Russia, the Germans appear to be making a stand on a mile-and-a-half deep defense line curving around Smolensk to the east.

The Russians are evidently striving to clear the line from Leningrad, through Moscow to the Black sea, with its rail and highway communications for shifting troops and supplies back and forth.

Free Radio Course May Evolve From Survey Being Made

A survey now being conducted by the News-Review radio station KRNR, in cooperation with the engineering, science and management defense training program of the government, involves the possibility of establishing a free course in radio communication for all interested persons holding high school diplomas.

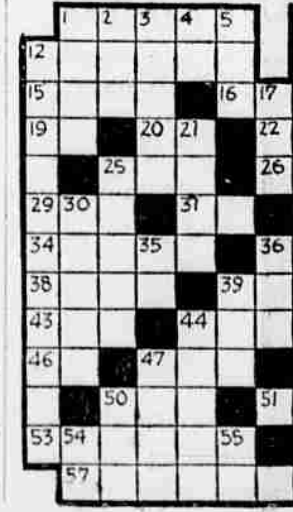
