Stanton, Roseburg; and Paul Applegate, Elkton.

District Attorney J. V. Long indicated that few matters so far are pending for grand jury investigation and a short term is anticipated.

Judge Carl E. Wimberly has announced that he will call the docket February 10, at which time all cases ready for trial will be set for hearing. In the event Judge Wimberly, now engaged in hearings in Coos and Lincoln counties, is unable to be present, the docket will be called by Judge G. F. Skipworth of Eugene.

The regular February term will begin February 16 and present indications are that there will be few cases to be heard by the jury.

Father of Roseburg Resident Passes Away

Word was received here today of the death at Ontario, Oregon, of Winfield Scott Davis, 59, father of Arnold Davis of Roseburg. He died suddenly Thursday from a heart ailment. Surviving are his widow, two sons and two daughters.
