Accidents in U. S. In 1941 Set New Record of Deaths

CHICAGO, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Accidents rolled up this toll in the United States last year: Killed—101,500 (including 40,000 traffic deaths, an all-time high).

Injured—9,300,000.

The cost—\$3,750,000,000.

The national safety council, which announced the figures today, gave this illustration of how they affect the nation's war effort:

Fatalities in the 20-45 year selective service age bracket totaled 26,000—equal to the destruction of nearly two army divisions.

Approximately 18,000 workers died in occupational accidents and another 29,000 were killed in off-the-job accidents—a loss of manpower sufficient to build 20 battleships, 200 destroyers and 7,000 heavy bombers.

Traffic accident deaths alone were greater in each of nine months in 1941 than total casualties in the Pearl Harbor attack.

The death toll was the third largest on record and 5 per cent above the 96,885 deaths in 1940. There were 110,952 accident deaths in 1936 and 105,205 in 1937.

Singapore Didn't Want Chinese Aid

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 30.—(AP)—Chen Ching K'un, University of Washington professor who returned from a trip to the Orient said he had information that six months ago the Chinese offered the British 250,000 troops to help defend Singapore. The Chinese professor said the

British "did not believe the Japanese would attack and so are facing the present crisis."

"The Japanese promote their divine mission theory to overcome a natural inferiority complex. If they win on their side of the Pacific they will not stop until they have won or are thoroughly beaten."

"The Chinese are thoroughly organized in the highlands of China now and can continue to produce their arms and ammunition even if the Burma road is cut off. However, if the road can be kept open another six months and the United States ship the Chinese enough arms and equipment for the available Chinese manpower, they can go ahead and defeat the Japanese themselves," he said.

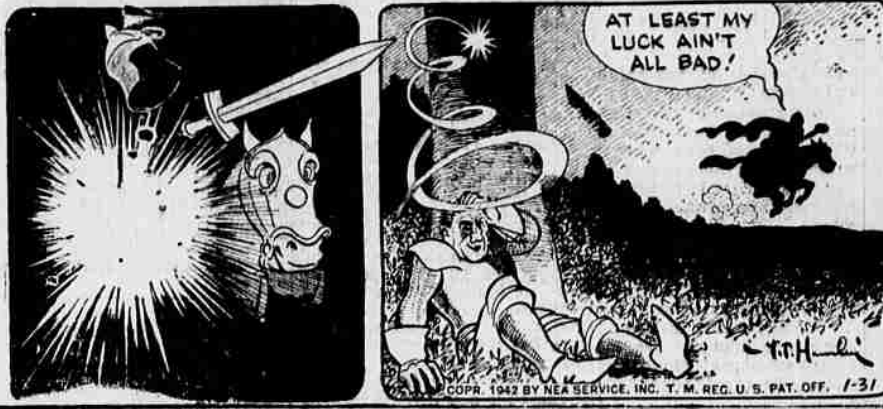

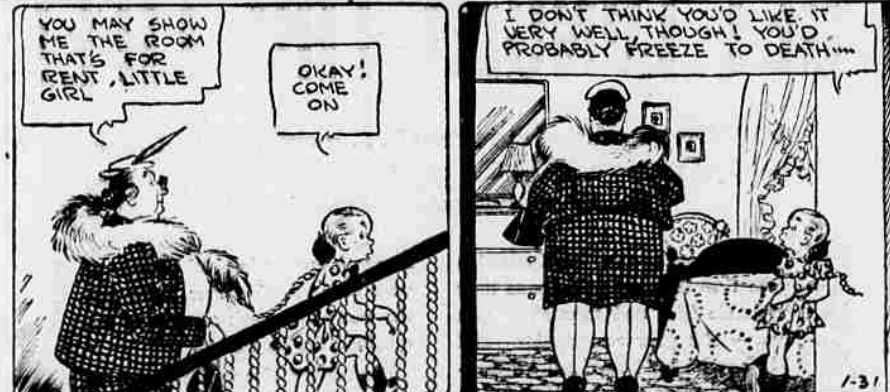
