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Our Strength in Truth

THE American people ask no more than to be told the truth. They will not be content with less.

Three times in recent weeks, Uncle Sam has held up a mirror in front of himself and said, "There, old ugly mug, how do you like THAT?"

MIRROR NO. 1 was the Truman report, which showed that our pre-war industrial production setup with its dollar-a-year men, its persuasive methods, its half-measures, was not good enough.

MIRROR NO. 2 was the senate naval affairs committee report, which showed that shocking profits have been made on some contracts.

MIRROR NO. 3 was the Roberts report on Pearl harbor, which showed childish lack of co-operation between army and navy heads before Pearl harbor, and complete miscalculation of the danger of attack with corresponding failure to prepare for it in the face of plain warnings.

We didn't like what we saw. None of us liked it.

What are we going to do about it?

FIRST of all, the production set-up has been changed; Donald Nelson has been given full charge and full authority to make it hum. The old half-way setup is already gone. The new all-out setup is already beginning to function. The warts should have been removed from this one already.

Second, the matter of war profits is up to congress. The entire American people are agreed on this: nobody shall get rich out of this war. It is up to congress either to thin out the contract gravy or skim it off in taxes. Congress is working on this. It can't work too fast or too thoroughly.

Third, it is to be presumed that the shock that must have run through the whole army and navy command at the deficiencies that led up to Pearl harbor more or less assures that the same mistakes won't happen again immediately. The appointment of supreme commanders in the Pacific war zones with full authority, and of the new AEP in Britain, with all branches responsible to them, indicates that the danger of lack of co-ordination has been sensed and partially remedied.

That's good, but not enough. The whole military setup, and the whole habit of military thinking must be revamped to fit modern conditions, and that as quickly as possible without fatal confusion. Here again the revelation of the whole truth is of the greatest service.

A FREE people can function only by knowing the truth? The greatest possible service has been done by these three brutally frank reports.

We want to know the worst. It's when we've been told the worst that we start doing something about making it better.

There is no other way to deal with a free people.

Remember?

A FEW years ago when some American newspapermen were just discovering South America there were a lot of stories about President Vargas of Brazil. Admittedly a good deal of a dictator, he was, some of the writers added, practically a fascist, and all too sympathetic to totalitarianism.

So comes the Rio de Janeiro conference to form a united front against the axis, and who stood firmest against the axis, who insisted most strongly on the

most drastic action? President Vargas.

Thus we see again demonstrated a truth about South American politics, but Latin America has dictators, but Latin America is patriotic and nationalistic. Even those rulers whose regimes fail to show up as 100 per cent democracies by the standard of American liberalism, are pretty sure to stand firm against foreign influence, and especially the subversive kind practiced by the totalitarian countries.

put out of commission. It is regarded as probable that plane defense for Singapore will be based at Batavia, on the island of Java, 600 miles away.

With the siege of Singapore starting, the siege of Bataan goes on. MacArthur reports that "determined enemy attempts at infiltration through our lines were frustrated."

The Japs are reported to be preparing another powerful attack, with heavy reinforcements.

MEANWHILE, the Japs hit hard again in a new place—the Dutch naval base of Amboina, lying just west of the Dutch part of the island of New Guinea. The assault is said to be a furious one, by both land and sea forces.

Amboina is the second most important Dutch naval base, and commands another of the passages by which allied reinforcements might be got inside the ring of the Indies islands.

The Japs are apparently seeking to close ALL these entrances.

THE British abandon Moulmein, across the gulf of Martaban from Rangoon, southern terminus of the Burma road. They retire across the Salween river "after removing stores and equipment" from Moulmein.

Apparently they plan to make a stand across the Salween. (Your map will tell you the meaning of all this.)

THERE is a notable dearth of news from Russia—which may or may not be important.

The Russians have been said for days to be on the brink of important successes that would compel serious German withdrawals.

When big events are in the wind, the news has a habit of closing down.

THERE are rumors in the wind of something big brewing in the Mediterranean.

Passenger train service in Italy is said to have been sharply restricted. This may indicate heavy movement of German forces southward. British intelligence (spy service) is said to have reported unusual concentrations of German planes in southern Italy.

It seems reasonable to expect that a blow at British strength in the Mediterranean is in the making.

ROMMEL is still apparently driving the British back from Bengasi.

Don't worry too much over these back-and-forth movements in desert Libya. The important points are Cairo to the east and Tripoli to the west. The maneuvering in the deserts in between is important only as it affects the fate of these points.

Daylight Saving Time Proclaimed for Oregon

SALEM, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Governor Sprague in a proclamation yesterday urged every Oregon citizen to advance their clocks one hour at 11 p. m. next Sunday.

The proclamation, in which the Governor ordered all state activities under his control to go on daylight saving time, conforms with a federal law prescribing such time for federal activities.

Daylight saving time will be in effect until congress decides to discontinue it. The present federal law provides it shall end six months after the end of the war.

Martin To Retain Chairmanship Of GOP During 1941

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr., (R-Mass.) quieted reports of an inter-factional struggle for control of his party's machinery by announcing today that he intends to retain his post as republican national chairman until after the November congressional elections.

Acting on the assumption that Martin wanted to be relieved of his duties as national chairman, some supporters of Wendell L. Willkie, the 1940 presidential nominee, were said to have been casting about recently for a possible successor. There were no indications that Willkie personally was connected in any way with this move.

These republicans were represented as none too pleased with Martin's recent appointment of Clarence B. Keland, veteran magazine writer and author, as publicity director for the national committee, feeling that some long-time supporter of Willkie should have been rewarded instead.

Martin said he planned to call the national committee members together in Chicago, shortly after the April 14 Illinois primary, for a discussion of congressional campaign plans. Thirty-four senatorial seats, including nine held by republicans, and all 435 house seats are at stake in the November voting.

Paid Aircraft Observers May Be Put on Lookouts

SALEM, Feb. 3.—(AP)—The army is giving consideration to hiring paid aircraft observers in remote areas, state defense coordinator Jerrold Owen said on returning from a meeting of western defense officials in San Francisco.

Owen said that Major General Jacob E. Fickel, commanding the fourth air force, announced that the remote observation posts would continue to be manned by volunteer observers until there is less danger from air raids.

Fickel said that arrangements soon would be completed for the army to hire paid observers in forest lookout posts at strategic spots west of the Cascades. He added that the army is seriously concerned with the danger of sabotage in Oregon and Washington forests during the coming fire season.

The army rejected Owen's request that Oregon be permitted to operate an amateur defense radio network, all amateurs now being off the air by federal order.

Lieut. Barney Walsh Sent To Fort Benning School

Lieutenant Bernard (Barney) Walsh, who left Friday after being called into active service in the U. S. army, has been assigned to the officers' school at Fort Benning, Georgia, according to word received here today. He is to be trained in the infantry school for rifles and heavy weapons. Mrs. Walsh and son, Michael, are remaining in Roseburg.

Oregon's Defense Bond Buyers May Total 225,000

PORTLAND, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Ray Conway, acting state administrator for the defense bond campaign, predicted today that 225,000 Oregon residents will have pledged purchases of bonds and stamps by the end of the week.

He said Multnomah county has accounted for 75,000 pledges to date and update Oregon another 100,000. The average yearly pledge is for \$100, a total to date of \$17,500,000, he added.

Oregon's Inheritance, Gift Taxes Set New High

SALEM, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Inheritance and gift tax collections during 1941 set an all-time record of \$1,669,943, compared with \$698,269 in 1940, state treasurer Scott said today.

Inheritance tax collections last year were \$1,471,643, the largest tax, \$874,000, being paid by the E. S. Collins estate of Portland. Gift tax collections were \$198,299.

Electric Power Rationing For U. S. Impending

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Wide World)—Rationing of electric power in nearly every sector of the country is expected in informed circles here.

War production board spokesmen say lights may have to be dimmed in huge cities from New York to San Francisco in order to pour power into a huge grid system feeding defense plants in other sections.

Representatives of the utility industry have predicted an adequate supply of electric power for the coming year but sources familiar with the power requirements of the new war program say a shortage is inevitable.

The strain which the new war production goals will place on power and raw material resources of this country stagger the imagination.

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Goals of Production Also Mean Shortage of Items For Homes and Business

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Home Will Be Affected

The drain on raw materials for tanks, planes and guns will leave little for civilian purposes. The situation is so acute, war production board spokesmen say, that by this summer nearly every item in the average home will be affected. Shortages are expected in more than a hundred commodities.

The probable supply of each raw material is strategic information and cannot be disclosed but this is the general picture as painted by those familiar with the situation. Except for two or three items, there will be enough materials for strictly military requirements but only in a few agricultural commodities like cotton and wheat are supplies expected to be ample for all civilian needs.

In canned foods, the steel and tin available will be used first to pack foods for the army, navy, Britain and Russia. What you will be able to eat out of cans will depend on what cans are left.

Increasing supplies of raw materials currently is one of the biggest jobs of the war production board, ranking right along with conversion of civilian industries as a major problem.

In the case of power, which cannot be increased quickly, the only course open is to cut civilian consumption.

Bad News For Business

Such a crisis in raw materials may seem fantastic but it was very real to industrial executives who visited Washington this week. One industrialist found that of a dozen raw materials vital to his business he could continue to obtain one for six months and a few more for two or three months. The rest he could no longer obtain at all.

This man's experience probably will have to be repeated in hundreds of other cases before the meaning of the changes of the past few weeks can be brought home to the business men of the country.
