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Ranting Doesn't Help

NO situation is more trying to
the soul of man than to be
helpless to prevent the destruc-
tion of something one loves; to
watch a catastrophe as one some-
times does in dreams when one
cannot lift a finger to avert it.

This sort of situation requires
courage and steadfastness. We
have to show it now.

General MacArthur's men in
the Philippines are showing a
courage and skill seldom equaled
in military annals. Against heavy
odds they have injected so much
hope into a hopeless situation
that it seems that help might
even bring them victory. Every
instinct cries "Get them that help,
somehow!" For those not charged
with military responsibility, it is
easy to cry out, "Why isn't some-
thing done?"

That is jumping up and down.
That is hand-wringing. It does
precisely no good, and it may do
a great deal of harm.

One U. S. senator cries out that
if the expedition sent to Ireland
had only been sent "across the
Pacific" it would have been much
better. Does he imply that the
sending of a few thousand troops to
Ireland actually prevented the
war department from sending as
many troops to the Pacific as
shipping facilities, convoys, and
Japanese blockade permit?

The question answers itself.
There are plenty of troops in the
country. The number that can be
sent to the Pacific is limited, not
by the number sent to Ireland,
but by factors of transport,
convoys, and the naval situation
in the Pacific.

Another Senator cries, "I am
sincerely hopeful that someone is
thinking of getting assistance to
the forces fighting in the Far
East."

That is really below the belt.

Would the senator say outright
what he implies, namely, that no-
body is thinking about it? He
knows better. He knows very
well that the war department is
thinking furiously about it. One
wonders if this senator would like
to assume personal responsibility
for sending transports into Man-
nala bay through the Japanese
naval screen that hangs like a
chain from Wake, Guam and the
Japanese mandated islands past
New Guinea, Borneo, Sarawak
and Indo-China to Hong-Kong.
Probably he would not. Yet in
implying that army and navy
authorities have not even con-
sidered the prospects, he suggests
that they should.

The country has a right to ex-
pect that the war and navy depart-
ments will take every possible step
to relieve MacArthur and the
whole situation in the Far East
that offers better than a 50-50
chance of gaining more than it
loses. Should it ever develop that
less than this was done, some-
body will sweat for it. But merely
to jump up and down shouting
"Why doesn't somebody DO some-
thing!" is of no help.

All this is better understood by
95 per cent of the American
people than by certain members
of the senate.

The Mean Woman

stead of being a Venus five feet
six in height, with 35-inch hips
and 25 inches around the waist,
she's positively dumpy, a mere

Murder Charged in Fire Deaths of 5 Prisoners

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Feb. 6—
(AP)—A complaint charging
Thomas Kelly, 24, with five
counts of murder in connection
with the deaths of five prisoners
in Wednesday's city jail fire, was
issued yesterday.

The blaze, in which 10 other
prisoners were injured, started in
the coked-in cell in which Kelly
was lodged. Pitts Mack, deputy
district attorney, who issued the
complaint, said he had decid-
ed to defer filing an arson charge.

Western Pacific War Situation Bad for Allies

Further Jap Gains Probable
Until Reinforcements Can
Turn Tide, Experts Assert

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(AP)—
Military and naval experts as-
serted today that the situation of
allied forces in the western Pacific
at the end of the second month
of war was very serious and that
still further reverses could be
expected.

While fully recognizing the he-
roic achievements of defenders in
the Philippines, Singapore and
the Dutch Indies and allowing for
Japanese losses of more than 100
ships and thousands of men, these
authorities grimly declared that
only the delivery of huge re-
inforcements—difficult if not im-
possible at this time—would turn
the tide of battle against the ene-
my.

The Japanese were said still to
possess the great advantages of
time and initiative seized in their
sneak attack on Pearl harbor, two
months ago tomorrow. Theirs is
the choice of when and how to
attack, and the costs they are
paying in troops and material
were described as not too great
for the advantages they have
made.

Allied Power Still in Making.
Effective reinforcements, espe-
cially in war planes, could
block further advances and hold
the threatened bastions still in al-
lied hands, it was said, for the
Japanese position has become vul-
nerable at many points.

But America's great striking
power is still largely in the fac-
tories and training camps. And
the material now ready for the
fighting fronts must be divided
among England, Russia and Afri-
ca as well as the Orient, and
transported with naval protection
over thousands of miles of dan-
gerous ocean.

Jap Gains Summarized
As strategists here view the
enemy gains in two months of
incessant action, the Japanese
have:

1. Prevented offensive use of the Pacific fleet for many weeks by the raid on Pearl harbor.
2. Forced the Asiatic fleet to withdraw from its Philippine bases and pushed the American defense forces on the islands into a last ditch stand on Bataan peninsula and in the forts covering Manila bay.
3. Completely overrun the Malay peninsula and put the British base of Singapore under siege with overwhelming forces after having destroyed the mainstays of British naval power in the Orient—the battleship Prince of Wales and the battle cruiser Repulse.
4. Made landings at various points in the Dutch East Indies so that without waiting for the fall of either the Philippines or Singapore they are already able to bomb such Dutch bases as Soerabaya, on which effective defense of the Indies depend.
5. Captured Moulmein and advanced toward the Burma road, threatening to cut the artery on which China depends for the lend-lease munitions she needs to continue the war.
6. Captured Hong Kong.

Typists, "Stenogs" In Urgent Demand

Need for stenographers and typists for service in departments of the federal government, and, particularly, for employment in Washington, D. C., is so urgent that local examinations have been authorized, C. B. Calkins, secretary of the local board of civil service examiners, reported today.

Mr. Calkins reports that he has been authorized to conduct civil service examinations locally for persons desiring positions as stenographer or typist. Several such examinations have been given here recently and those who successfully passed the test have received assignments within a period of a week, he reports.

Applicants, either male or female, must be between the ages of 18 to 53 years. The requirements have been lowered so that the examination calls for short-hand only at the rate of 80 words per minute and typing 40 words per minute.

Persons interested are invited to contact Mr. Calkins at the Roseburg post office. He will provide full instructions and arrange for the required tests.

Nearly 4,000 in Oregon Taking Defense Courses

SALEM, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Nearly 4,000 persons are taking defense training courses in Oregon, while another 2,500 are enrolled in supplementary classes in the Portland shipyards, the United States employment service said today.

Many of those taking the courses are workers who have lost their jobs in industries which are being converted to war production.

Of the 14,482 persons selected for defense training last year, 4,366 took aviation work, 3,651 welding, 1,787 sheet metal, and 1,485 machine shop.
