Jap Strength In China Reported

CHUNGKING, China, Feb. 5.—(AP)—A Chinese communiqué today said Japanese infiltrations had been pushed back to the east and west of Waichow, a port on the East river in Kwangtung province, which recently was recaptured by the Chinese.

On both sides of the Chang river, in the Nanchang area, the Chinese reported they slaughtered or wounded 2,600 Japanese, wiping out a garrison at a railroad town on the east bank.

Five hundred soldiers of the Nanking puppet regime who recently deserted the Japanese and joined Chiang Kai-Shek are being reorganized behind the Chinese lines, the Chinese reported.

A Chinese army spokesman said today that five Japanese divisions totaling about 100,000 men had been withdrawn from China since the Pacific war began.

He said the peak Japanese strength in China was 371 divisions in July and August, 1941, and that the total now was about 700,000 men.

The withdrawals were effected by thinning out garrisons and strengthening protection of roads and railways to enable mobile columns to move rapidly to support any threatened garrison, he added.

The Japanese had another 700,000 men in Manchuria, Korea and South Sakhalin, the spokesman said. There have been withdrawals from Manchuria, but he said the extent was unknown.

China has the potential strength for an effective counter-offensive, he declared, but declined to intimate when it might be made.

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Mountain Boys Prove Best Shots In Naval Service

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 6.—(AP)—When a nickel covers a group of five shots in the bull's eye, "usually it's the mountain boys" who did the firing, says Chief Gunner's Mate B. R. Hembree, in charge of small arms instruction at the Norfolk naval base.

Hembree, who has a well earned reputation for his own ability with a rifle, can spot a mountain sharpshooter in the middle of a platoon of recruits at 50 paces.

Hundreds of men pass under Hembree's keen eyes during his course on the use of the navy's standard small arms—lanky boys from the Tennessee hills and soft spoken men from the Texas flatlands—and as each squad passes, Hembree selects those who come from the stock that has made famous the name of American sharpshooting.

"Maybe it's the way they pick up the guns, sort of gently, as though they were going to talk to them," Hembree said today. "Maybe it's the steadiness of their hands or the wide set of their eyes. Mostly, though, it's what they do to the targets."

The chief gunner's mate selected an example from a sheaf of targets and held it up. A nickel would have covered the group of five shots in the bull's eye. "Not all of them can do that, of course," he said "usually it's the mountain boys."

Handling a vastly accelerated program that sometimes rushes 300 men daily through his lectures and demonstrations, Hembree has little time for anything but the straight essentials. "You can spend all the money you want on defense," he asserted, "but it won't do you any good unless you've got a man out there at the front of the line who knows how to shoot a gun."
