Manufacturers and stores are out to make the most of this year. They're more, not less, style-conscious. That goes for budget clothes producers particularly.

And are they pointing with pride? They point, for instance to Mary Lewis' "Under-Ten-Dollars" collection.

She styled these clothes for a mall order house, which calls them "catalogue fashions." It presented them with all the fanfare of a custom-designer opening—well, literally, in the Ritz.
