Nelson to Advise People Via Radio On Aiding in War

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Donald M. Nelson will broadcast to the nation Monday night and, a spokesman said, in this and three subsequent radio talks, the war production chief will "hand out assignments to all classes of citizens, telling them what they can do to help win the war."

"Mr. Nelson will spend most of the time examining the allegation that there is too much smugness and complacency in the country, and that people are confused about what they can do to help the war effort," the spokesman said.

The first address (6:45 to 7 p.
