U. S., British Citizens Arrested in Reprisals

BERLIN (from German broadcasts) Mar. 7.—(AP)—German dispatches from Shanghai said today a number of prominent United States and British citizens, including newspaper correspondents and business men, had been arrested by the Japanese in Shanghai.

The arrests were described as reprisals for the treatment of Japanese in the United States. "These persons will be treated well although they are under arrest," the report said, "and compared with the Japanese arrested in the United States they are enjoying quite a number of privileges."

Sabotage Suspected in Magnesium Plant Fire

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Mar. 7.—(AP)—Wind-whipped flames destroyed the \$25,000 administration building of the Basic Magnesium Plant, Inc., last night. The \$33,000,000 project, financed by the Defense Plant Corp., is scheduled to begin producing magnesium for warplane factories about June 1.

Lawrence G. McNeil, head of McNeil Construction company, the contractors, said he suspected sabotage because the flames started in a corner where wind would whip them through the structure.

Advertising Increases Since Pearl Harbor Raid

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 7.—(AP)—The average American reads his newspaper at least half an hour longer since Pearl harbor, in the opinion of President Don Belding of the Pacific Advertising association.

"Our surveys show that advertising has greatly increased in its effectiveness since the war began," Belding said. "The reasons are two-fold. First, there is more and better reading of papers because of the interest in war news. Second, people have more time to read the paper because of the tire shortage and changed living habits."

"As the tire shortage forces people more and more to ride

street cars and buses to and from work, the newspaper habit will become more and more fixed. The new reading habits of the people are reflected in the fact that the general circulation of newspapers since Pearl harbor is going up."
