Woman's Work

WITH agriculture and industry
facing a severe shortage of
manpower, women's part in our
war effort is becoming a role of
increasing importance. Already
the department of labor is survey-
ing the possibility of large-scale
recruiting of women workers to
forestall the threatening slow-
down.

In many vital war production
plants the goal of round-the-clock
machine operation is not being
met because of a lack of skilled
workmen. At the same time the
country's farmers are seriously
concerned with the continuing
shift of farm labor to war indus-
tries.

The labor department finds a
potential force of six million wo-
men workers available by the end
of 1942. It suggests as the first
source those now unemployed or
temporarily idle because of prior-
ties or factory conversions. Many
other workers might be found
among the young women who
will complete their schooling this
year. Not until these sources are
utilized does the department
advise calling on the estimated
two million housewives between
the ages of 18 and 44 who could
be spared from homes where
there are no small children.

Viereck, Top Nazi Mouthpiece In U. S., Sentenced

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14.—(AP)—The maximum sentence of two to six years was imposed in district court yesterday upon George Sylvester Viereck, convicted of hiding his activities as a German propaganda agent.

In addition, Justice F. Dickson Letts fined the German-born American citizen a total of \$1,500 and assessed him costs of the case.

Viereck, who wrote for years in magazines of national circulation, was accused by the govern-
ment of being Hitler's propa-
ganda generalissimo in the United States.

Before the sentence, Viereck read a lengthy statement to the court, justifying his position, and the prosecutor, William Power Maloney, told Justice Letts that Viereck had put himself beyond the vale of mercy.

Viereck was found guilty re-
cently by a district court jury on
charges of failing to advise the
state department fully of his ac-
tivities as a foreign agent. The
defendant did register, but not
completely, the government con-
tended.

Oregon's Young People Will Get Defense Training

SALEM, Mar. 14.—(AP)—Gov-
ernor Sprague yesterday appoint-
ed a statewide committee, headed
by H. C. Seymour of Corvallis,
state 4-H club leader, to direct
young people in various types of
defense work.

The governor, asking all county
defense councils to appoint sim-
ilar county committees, said
youths will be given an active
part in the civilian defense pro-
gram, but that existing youth or-
ganizations will not be interfered
with.

Basketball Title Rests Between Astoria, Corvallis

SALEM, Mar. 14.—(AP)—The
Astoria fishermen, defending
state champions, and the Corvallis
Spartans meet tonight for the
Oregon High school basketball
title.

Astoria literally raced away
from the Baker Bulldogs last
night, 45-33, and Corvallis scored
its third straight upset by trim-
ming Medford, 42-29.

Astoria, at top speed from start
to finish, seized an early lead
from the eastern Oregonians and
by intermission time had a 26-17
advantage. The gap was widened
to 33-19 in the third quarter
and Fishermen reserves finished
out the contest.

Only Tommy Holman, all-state
guard last year, was effective
against the nimble Astorians,
scoring 12 points. For the As-
torians, who apparently take
turns scoring, Guard Cliff Crand-
all was high with 15 points.

Corvallis, third-place team in
the no name league and with only
a mediocre season record, showed
increasing strength in defeating
Medford. Forward Jason Wid-
mer, fleet Corvallis mite, darted
through the Medford defense for
12 points to tie big center Bob
Reiman for scoring honors.

Corvallis was ahead, 17-11, at
the half, widening the gap in the
closing periods.

Baker and Medford will play at
7:30 p. m. for third place.

The fourth-place game pitted
North Bend, fourth-place winner
last year, against Mount Angel,
state Catholic prep champion.
North Bend defeated McMinn-
ville, 45-31, and Mount Angel
downed Hillsboro, 44-40.
