Senate Votes to Seat North Dakota's Langer

WASHINGTON, Mar. 28—(AP)—The senate yesterday voted to seat William Langer, a republican, as senator from North Dakota, a post to which he was elected in November, 1940.

By a vote of 52 to 30, the chamber rejected a resolution to deny Langer membership on the grounds that he had been guilty of moral turpitude during a long and stormy political career in his home state.

Just before the final vote the senate, by a margin of 45 to 37, voted that unless two-thirds of those balloting on the removal resolution approved it, Langer should remain in office.

Mormon Crickets Begin Hatching in Oregon

MADRAS, Mar. 28—(AP)—Mormon crickets were reported hatching today in large numbers on the Warm Springs Indian reservation.

VFW Post Called On for Apology In Relief Charge

PORTLAND, Mar. 28—(AP)—The Oregon public welfare commission yesterday demanded full retraction of charges made against it by the Willard Anderson post VFW, The Dalles. Administrator Elmer R. Goudy said the board asked the post to give "as wide publicity to the retraction as was given to the original charge" and threatened "other steps" if retractions were not forthcoming.

He said the post, in a resolution passed several weeks ago and signed by Charles Vester, post commander, and William H. McNeal, adjutant, accused the commission of "legalized subversive activities" with the adoption of a "Hitler-like decree."

It claimed the commission instructed county case workers "that anyone who can afford to buy a defense bond was not considered to be in need" and are not eligible for relief. Specifically, the commission was accused of cutting off the assistance to Henry Bertrand, blind operator of a cigar stand in The Dalles postoffice, because he had purchased a defense bond, Goudy said.

The administrator explained that the assistance was withdrawn from Bertrand because his income from the cigar stand had made him self-supporting and under federal and state law he could no longer qualify for public aid. The fact that he bought a defense bond had nothing to do with the withdrawal, Goudy continued.

Glendale High School Band to Give Concert

GLENDAL, Ore., Mar. 28—The Glendale High school band, directed by Robert Belieu, will give a concert in the high school auditorium Thursday, April 2, at 8 p. m. The band was organized this year and now has an enrollment of twenty-four members.

The guest artist for the evening will be twelve year old Dorlene Hughes, from Portland. Miss Hughes will play a clarinet solo "Elegance" by Carl Frankler. She will also play this number at the state solo contest this spring.

Shells From New Type Cannon Fly By Own Power

NEW YORK, Mar. 28—(AP)—Science has fashioned its first cannon of the future, to shoot shells which fly by their own power with jet propulsion.

This first weapon is small, a light metal tube three inches in diameter, four feet long. The shells are six inches long, a little more than two inches thick.

It is entirely experimental, but it is at once a principle recognized as sound by aviation engineers. The gun was designed by Edward F. Chandler, New York engineer, and is described in Astronautics, journal of the American rocket society.

The purpose is to experiment with the jets, of burning powder, gasoline, liquid oxygen and other power sources, to drive the shell. Jets which drive an 18-foot long projectile seven miles have been developed by Dr. Robert Goddard in New Mexico. Lesser jets have been tested in the rocket society. None of these were military.

The new experiment seeks to adapt the information to explosive shells. Power and distance already are available. But problems of accuracy in flight, cheapness of construction, and types of fuel have yet to be solved.

Chandler says the experiments indicate that the direction can be fixed in the gun so that the fire-winged shell flight will take it to the target.

Advantages of the guns include very light weight.
