A Good Plan

A week ago the Douglas county court announced the acquisition for the county of a tract of land at Winston for the purpose of creating a new county home. With this action we are in heartiest accord. The old county home has been the subject of criticism for years. Grand Juries have condemned it repeatedly. It is not satisfactory for a variety of reasons.

The property for the new home was acquired at a very low price. It is beautifully located on the banks of the South Umpqua river. The 34 acres of the tract is some of the best farm land in our valley. The court plans to have the home partially if not entirely self-sustaining.

In our opinion the establishment of this modern home will actually benefit and improve the general neighborhood. We have noticed that the existence of the home in its present location has in no way detracted from the value of surrounding property. In fact some very fine homes are in that vicinity. Perhaps the critical thought goes back in history to the time where there was what was called the "county poor farm" in most counties. That, we must point out, is a condition of the old days. There is no such thing any longer as a "poor farm." Aged or disabled people who have no means of support are now cared for in modern well-managed homes. The new home proposed will be such an institution.

To Commissioner H. B. Roadman, a pat on the back for sticking with his idea of improving conditions for the needy old folks of this county. We had thought his plan a bit ambitious for the financial ability of our county but the basis upon which the proposal is planned now the cost will be little with an eventual saving in prospect.

been the powder keg of Europe. They are an explosive mixture of hatreds and suspicions. Each Balkan country hates and suspects each other Balkan country and ALL SURROUNDING countries.

It is practically a historical axiom that when something is STARTED in the Balkans no one knows where it will END.

IF Hitler is reduced to the extremity of seeking the aid of these unpredictable and highly explosive Balkan countries, it is a sign that he may be scraping the bottom of the barrel at home.

LET'S not be rosy in our thinking. Much bloody fighting must be done before Germany and Japan can be licked. But also let's not overlook the fact that the axis no longer has the world by the tail with a downhill pull.

AS spring advances, the tempo of British bombing of Germany and German-held western Europe steps up.

Thursday night armadas of British four-engine bombers (dispatches say there may have been as many as 250 of them) smashed at Germany's industrial Ruhr valley with TWO-TON bombs. The great KRUPP works at Essen were the principal target.

A two-ton bomb works a lot of havoc.

(Slowing down German war

production is the objective of these raids.)

CRIPPS meets Gandhi and has a long talk with him. Dispatches from New Delhi say that while details of the plan for giving India self-government remain secret there is a general feeling in political quarters that leaders of the Congress party (Gandhi's outfit) and the MOSLEM LEAGUE have found the fundamental principles satisfactory.

That, if true, would mean that the first big hurdle has been jumped.

ON the home front, an 18-billion-dollar appropriation bill for the army goes to the house of representatives.

This bill boosts to MORE THAN 160 BILLIONS the total of defense and war appropriations made and in prospect in this country since July 1, 1940.

Remember: These are only APPROPRIATIONS, which are made by the simple scratch of a pen. Hitler and the Japs won't be bothered by mere appropriations running into the quadrillions.

What will COUNT will be finished equipment and trained fighting men.

FDR orders first priority on shipments of war supplies to Russia.

Again a mere order, made by the scratching of a pen, means little. Only COMPLETED SUPPLIES AND SHIPS TO TRANSPORT THEM will matter.

Actual production is the only measure of our war effort that is of the slightest importance.

aid. Being the No. 1 target area of the United States, the people of the northwest know what they are doing and know what they want congress to do or refrain from doing.

Arnold Arouses Resentment

In face of administration opposition, Thurman Arnold, the official trust-buster of the department of justice, declares the labor unions are running the country; are dictating to farmers, destroying small independent merchants and doing things which no other organization in the country can do—and getting away with it. Mr. Arnold knows; he has tried to convict union racketeers, but while he has hooked the big corporations for violating the anti-trust laws the union leaders slip through his fingers. White House has been sent word that Arnold is a man to get rid of.

H. S. Raushenbush, who directed the meetings of the O. L. Chapman group in the northwest early this month, has had some of his "liberal" writings spread on the congressional record in connection with the supply bill of the department of the interior. Raushenbush, it appears from his writings, is opposed to the profit motive and he wants the government to take over banks, power systems and other items. He has reluctantly abandoned accomplishing these things by bloody revolution (his books were quoted) and proposes that clever young college men be infiltrated into industries and there work as termites, boring from within. Mr. Raushenbush sets out his advice, for he has become chief of the research and planning section of the power division of the interior department.

It is difficult to state when the flood of critical letters began to arrive, but the groundswell was noticeable the latter part of February and burst out, for example, in radio talks, such as at Twin Falls, Oda, early in March, and in innumerable indignation meetings throughout the northwest. Climax came about the idea of March when the people paid their income tax (thousands for the first time).

What People Demand

Approximately, these are the things the people are demanding (or else): Cut out waste speed production, control the labor situation and make it unnecessary to pay tribute to a union before getting a job in a shipyard, aircraft factory or other war work; cut out appropriations for government inspectors and agents to ride over the country in Pullmans; cut out the press agents; suspend the 40-hour week, which was enacted to provide more jobs; provide the soldiers with all the weapons they require (most of the letter writers have boys taken into the service and they want their sons to have equipment; they also wish to know more about who is running the war). People complain that they have not been told enough not military secrets, but just plain news.

The plain people resent that they are not considered competent. Without aid or suggestion from the national capital bands of guerrillas have been and are being organized by the thousand along the Oregon coast, the Washington coast and the idea is spreading into Idaho to combat paratroopers. Thousands of men and women are volunteering at filter centers; familiarizing themselves with bandages and first

Stenographers Urgently Needed

The federal government is in urgent need of stenographers and typists for work at Washington, D. C., according to a message received here today by C. B. Calkins, secretary of the local board of civil service examiners. The civil service, he states, has been requested to secure 600 stenographers and typists from the states of the Pacific northwest during the month of April.

Women between the ages of 18 and 35 will be accepted. The requirements for eligibility have been lowered, Mr. Calkins states, and a stenographer who can take dictation at the rate of 80 words per minute and a typist who can type at the rate of 40 words per minute can qualify. Starting salary is \$1,440 per year in each grade. Examinations are given locally and notification to successful applicants to report for duty usually is received within a few days after the tests are given.

Persons interested may obtain further information and application blanks from C. B. Calkins at the Roseburg post office.

Douglas County's Registrants in War Draft Lottery of March 16th Are Listed

Following are the order and serial numbers of men registered with the Douglas county selective service board on Feb. 16, 1942. The order numbers were determined by a lottery held March 17 and appear in the first column below. The number 10,000 was arbitrarily added to all order numbers of the third draft in order to simplify handling. Thus No. 10234 would indicate that the registrant holding such number is number 234 in order of call in this registration. The same rule applied to higher numbers, such as 11234 would indicate the registrant to be 1234 in order number. The serial number, appearing in the second column below, running from 1 through 1550, was affixed by the local board for identification. Both the serial number and order number in each case is officially preceded by the letter "T" as the designation for the third draft. The letter is omitted from the list published herewith. Publication of order and serial numbers of registrants will continue until the entire list is made available for News-Review readers.
