The number 10,000 was ar bitrarily added to all order numbers of the third draft in order to simplify handling. Thus No. 10234 would indicate that the regisrent holding such number is number 234 in order of call in this registration. The same rule applied to higher numbers, such as 11234 would indicate the registrant to be 1234 in order number. The serial number, appearing in the second column below, running from 1 through 1550, was affixed by the local board for identification. Both the serial number and order number in each case is officially preceded by the letter "T" as the designation for the third draft. The letter is omitted from the list published herewith. Until the 10th Dorazio, a 3-to-1 underdog, virtually wes on even terms and had a splendid opportunity to score a major upset. In the sixth Dora zio, who at 190 held a five-pound weight advantage, had Bettina on the verge of a knockout. But Bettina saved himself by staggering into a clinch.

It was Bettina's 10th straight victory as a heavyweight since ne lost his lightheavy crown. If he beats Beckwith, Promoter Her man Taylor said he plans to match him with either Max Baer or Lou Nova in an outdoors bout

WASHINGTON, April 1-(AP) President Roosevelt disclosed All-yesterday that the \$65,000,000 "ama war fund sought by the American plan. Red Cross had been oversubscrib-

He said he had received a letter from Norman Davis, Red Cross chairman, which recalled a presi-dential proclamation of December 7 asking for a \$50,000,000 war fund. This sum was on hand by February 7, Davis said, and the Red Cross then asked that the obevtice be raised by \$15,000,000.

#### Raid Damage Insurance to Private Property Offered

WASHINGTON, April 1-(AP) President Roosevelt has signed bill authorizing a \$1,000,000,000 fund for the war damage corporation to provide federal insurance against damage to private prop-erty resulting from enemy air

The act does not stipulate the insurance terms, but Secretary of Commerce Jesse H. Jones, under whose jurisdiction the corporation operates, has said the premium rates would range upward from \$1 per \$1,000.
