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Let's Cooperate

THE management of the Umpqua National forest desires to keep the forest open to the full extent possible for public use during the coming summer months. Supervisor V. V. Harpman reports in a statement given to the News-Review today. For this program the general public should be extremely grateful. The great task of the forest service during the coming months is to completely prohibited all entry into the forests—an action which it is fully authorized to take. But the forest service is not composed of that kind of folk. The men comprising the forest service love our rugged wooded mountains and our beautiful streams. They want everyone to share the scenic grandeur and the recreational resources with them. They are bewildered by the fact that there are those who would wantonly despoil these treasures.

THE importance of this year's task is stressed in a statement of policy recently received by the forest service as follows: "The fire protection job this season bids fair to be a difficult one. War industries and the armed forces have called many of the experienced forest men; industry and defense activities have consumed all surplus labor; many new people unfamiliar with forest protection principles have come into the forests for work; the use of industrial or woods crews to fight forest fires will rob our fighting men and our allies of much needed supplies and equipment; the uneasiness and hysteria caused by forest fires will strain already tense nerves and a smoke pall that will interfere with coastal defense activities is something to be avoided. At no time in the history of the United States has the nation's timber resource played such an important part in national welfare."

DESPITE the conditions listed above, the forest service desires to keep the forests open for the greatest public use. Because tire and gasoline rationing will make long trips impossible for many people this year, there will be an increasing dependence upon the forests for recreational use.

We should deeply appreciate what the forest service is doing for our welfare and happiness. We should show that appreciation by our greatest measure of cooperation. We can cooperate, first, by individual action in observing every possible safety precaution and strict compliance with forest rules. Second, we can cooperate by giving the forest service any information we might be able to obtain to aid in the apprehension of incendiaries. There should be no hesitancy in reporting to the law enforcement agencies any person who will willfully destroy these timber resources so vitally needed in our national program.
