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No Substitute Will Do

YOU may not have thought of it in just this way, but it is a fact that nearly all of the things that are no longer available—or are "frozen"—are things that people got along very well without just a short time ago. Take the common tooth-paste tube, for example. It appeared on retail shelves within the memory of many now living. The auto, the radio, the electric refrigerator, rubber tires—dozens of other items are relatively new. But before these things existed people lived and were happy and got along really very well.

This is not, of course, to argue that we do not any longer need the things that are common in our lives up to date but barred from our possession in the future. We do need those things—we have been educated by usage to be virtually dependent upon them. Our point is that we are not dependent upon these forbidden items—people always did get along without them. If we have to do so, we can get along without them just as our forefathers did.

The most important thing in the lives of any of us is the necessity for winning the war. The United Nations MUST win. But our need for victory is not a need of gadgets. It is not the tin, or the rubber, or the oil—or any material things, that we are fighting for. Far from it. There may finally be created substitutes for any and everything we lack in a material way. But no substitute can be created, or ever will be discovered, for the great, the real necessity for victory. We are fighting for the right to live in the way we choose, to govern ourselves as good or as poorly as we wish; to go and come when we please and where we please and to worship whatever God we please in whatever manner that pleases us. We are fighting for a way of life that, though it does not guarantee happiness, makes happiness possible. We are fighting for tolerance, for a world in which all will live and let live. We are fighting to keep the shadow, the fearful darkness that results from power held closely, from falling upon our land. We are fighting also, therefore, to lift this shadow from the conquered peoples and finally from over the lives of the very lands where it was spawned.

These things are not mere gadgets; these are not things substitutes will replace. These needs are as vital as life itself.

AS to this business of price control, there is more than a suspicion that the leaders in whose hands authority has been placed haven't taken human nature into consideration in their handling of prices.

When people are told that articles that are STILL TO BE HAD are due to disappear from the markets soon, it is HUMAN NATURE to rush in and buy them.

Here is a personal example. When it was announced a few days ago that manufacture of cigarette lighters is to be stopped, this writer UNCONSCIOUSLY reached into his pocket, fingered a two-year-old gift lighter and wondered if it wouldn't be a good idea to go out and buy ANOTHER one while the buying was still good.

Humiliation followed realization that that would be HOARDING. But there was that instinctive urge to go out and buy while the buying is good.

REALLY sound and wise leaders take human nature into consideration when they make their plans and issue their orders. MacArthur undoubtedly took Filipino human nature into consideration in making his plans. That is why the Filipinos are willing to fight and die for him.

If our leaders in Washington will take American human nature a little more into consideration in making their plans and issuing their orders in connection with prices they will get better co-operation from the public.

Parkinson to Speak at Retailers' Conference

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 6.—(Special)—Thomas Parkinson of Parkinson's Food market in Roseburg, has been selected as a speaker for the conference of the Oregon Retail Distributors' Institute to be held on the University of Oregon campus on April 15 and 16, it was announced here by Dr. N. H. Conish, professor of business administration at the university and secretary of the institute.

Most of the problems to come before the retailers will center on the war and on inflationary tendencies. The principal subjects will include government regulations, price trends, buying, store standards and stock shortages.

Metal Works Closed in Taking of Shipyard Job

The Rice and Meyers Sheet metal works was closed Saturday by George Rice, who is moving to Astoria, for the duration of the war, having accepted employment as a sheet metal worker with a contractor who holds contracts for work on 12 minesweepers being constructed in the Astoria shipyards. Mr. Rice reported that it was necessary for him to close the shop here because of inability to secure materials, due to wartime restrictions on metals. His partner, Glenn Meyers, has been employed for several weeks in shipyard work at Bremerton. Mr. Rice reported he plans to return to Roseburg after completing his work in the shipyards.

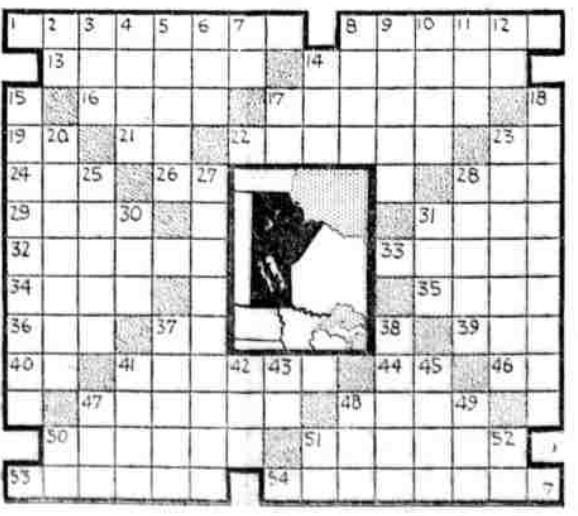

Douglas County's Registrants in War Draft Lottery of March 16th Are Listed

Following are the order and serial numbers of men registered with the Douglas county selective service board on Feb. 16, 1942. The order numbers were determined by a lottery held March 17 and appear in the first column below. The number 10,000 was arbitrarily added to all order numbers of the third draft in order to simplify handling. Thus No. 10234 would indicate that the registrant holding such number is number 234 in order of call in this registration. The same rule applied to higher numbers, such as 11234 would indicate the registrant to be 1234 in order number. The serial number, appearing in the second column below, running from 1 through 1550, was affixed by the local board for identification. Both the serial number and order number in each case is officially preceded by the letter "T" as the designation for the third draft. The letter is omitted from the list published herewith. Publication of order and serial numbers of registrants will continue until the entire list is made available for News-Review readers.
