William Thompson, 53, World war veteran, formerly of Bellingham, Washington, died at the veterans hospital here Sunday. He was born at Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, and prior to the war moved to the west coast, where he was employed in the lumber industry in Washington and Oregon.

He enlisted in the United States army August 16, 1918, and served as private, first class, bakery company, 338th quartermaster corps, Camp Lee, Virginia. He was discharged January 21, 1919.

Surviving are three sisters, Mrs. Olga Sandwick and Mrs. George Ringstad, both of Bellingham, Washington, and Mrs. G. A. Moon of Mount Vernon, Washington.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. Perry Smith officiating. Military services and interment will follow at the Veterans cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of the Douglas Funeral home.

Carpentry Class Keeps Busy at Canyonville

CANYONVILLE, April 6.—The carpentry class at Canyonville now has a new project. Started in March to train men for jobs in connection with construction of army cantonments, the students, who are being instructed by Mark Elliott in rough carpentry, saw filing and painting, had about run out of practice materials.

The nine pupils had built saw horses, a table, a locker for tools, an extension for the stage in the auditorium, and had filed about all the saws to be found in town and have been wondering where they could find something else to practice on.

The problem was solved when the Methodist church board authorized the class to proceed with the construction of a woodshed and garage at the parsonage. The building will have a cement foundation and will be painted.

The class is allowed \$15 weekly for lumber, nails and other materials for a period of eight weeks. Several new members are expected to enroll from Riddle and Days Creek.

Beavers Take 3 Of 1st 5 Games

As the club almost universally chosen to finish a spanking last in this wartime baseball campaign, Portland could lay justifiable claim today to having hatched the coast league's major early season phenomenon.

The Beavers have managed to win three of their first five games. That did not succeed in gaining them first place—a position reserved jointly for Seattle and San Francisco—but it did mean they will embark upon the second week of play with more victories than any rival can muster.

Speece, a righthander, tipped the scales in Portland's favor. He struggled through four bad innings in the seven-inning game of yesterday's double-header against San Diego then held the Padres hitless and runless the rest of the way.

His teammates cracked four San Diego pitchers for four runs in the sixth, two in the seventh and a 6-5 decision.

Earlier the Padres had topped the Beavers, 6-3, in a nine inning stand, the victory coming on a three-run rally in the eighth, but this Portland already had offset by winning, 4-2, Saturday when Orrell blanked the foe in all but one frame.

Elsewhere in the league Sunday activity was limited to the doings at Hollywood, where the home team's 5-3 and 1-8 split with Oakland also meant an even break in the series at two games each. The Oaks won Saturday, 4-3.

Seattle and Sacramento, Los Angeles and San Francisco were idle.
