DR. CHAS. A. EDWARDS

It is a breath-taking thought. God proved Himself once and for all, more than equal to sin at its worst. He gave His children that greatest gift of all, the gift of freedom of judgment and of choice. He made allowance for a possible abuse of that gift. Just as at one time, He breathed into man His living spirit, so at one point in time, He put away sin by the sacrifice of Himself. The cross stands as the timeless point in time when sin received its death blow. Death stung itself to death when it stung Christ, and love supreme has its assurance of victory. Why, then, does sin remain? Why does it appear to exercise such strident victory over goodness and truth? Doubtless sin remains because our human freedom remains. There is no word in the New Testament to suggest that the death of Christ marked the end of an age when men fought against God, or the beginning of a new era when all men would seek the divine will and pursue it. There are still those who love darkness rather than light and who, because of their love of darkness do not comprehend the light but those who love the light rather than darkness, find in the cross the guarantee of the final victory of the truth of God and in their own hearts the assurance that the sacrifice of Jesus Christ saves a person from his sins. Only Christ can do that. How He does it is a mystery, but that He does it no one can deny. Amen.

Kodiak Bear Loses Bout With Tractor

KODIAK, Alaska, April 8.—(AP)—In the first recorded battle between a Kodiak bear and a caterpillar tractor, the triumphantly snorting machine emerged undented by the most ferocious antagonist known to these northern wilds.

A "running" account of the clash was given in the latest issue of the Kodiak Bear, the service men's publication at Ft. Greeley. The running was done by the tractor driver, identified only as "Uncle Jim."

With rare snap judgment, he decided to let the tractor go it alone with the bear. Leaving the motor running, he scooted to a grandstand seat up the nearest tree.

The bruin nosed in close to feel out its chugging adversary, then jumped back with a howl of pain. It had poked its nose onto the hot manifold or into the flailing arms of the fan. The first round was the tractor's by a wide margin.

Second round: Still stung and seeking a quick knockout, the bear loosed its Sunday punch, a wild Kodiak haymaker. The mechanical behemoth was unmoved, but the bear took the round on aggressiveness.

The bear failed to report for the third round. Much to Uncle Jim's relief—his elevated ring-side seat didn't exactly afford Madison Square garden comfort—the big bruin ambled off to quieter haunts.

Sales Tax Plan Opposed By CIO

WASHINGTON, April 8.—(AP)—The CIO went on record yesterday as strongly opposed to a sales tax as a revenue-raising measure and proposed, instead, that congress impose still higher taxes on corporations.

In a statement presented to the house ways and means committee Philip Murray, CIO president, said that the worst possible revenue measure which could be enacted would be a general sales tax of any character.

"Such a tax would be inflationary; it would bear with unfair and unequal weight on wage earners and working farmers, and it would hamper the war production effort," Murray said.

Calling for increased levies on business and "the wiping out of swollen war profits," the Murray statement said the CIO advocated these alternatives:

That the excess profits tax credit be based on a percentage of net worth alone; or if the average earnings over the base 1936-1939 period be used, the percentage of earnings in that period which is allowed as a credit be reduced from the present 95 per cent to 75 per cent or less.

Herschel Flesher, Vet Of World War, Passes

Herschel R. Flesher, 44, World war veteran, resident of Cottage Grove, Oregon, died at the vet-

erans hospital here last night. He was born at Milo, Iowa, December 12, 1897, and enlisted in the United States army on April 13, 1918, serving as private, Casualty company, No. 1273. He was discharged July 16, 1919.

Surviving is his widow, Mrs. Gertrude Flesher of Cottage Grove. The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral home and funeral arrangements will be announced later.
