WASHINGTON, April 20.—(AP)—The agriculture adjustment agency of the agriculture department has notified Senator McNary of Oregon that 300 combines needed by Oregon winter legume seed growers were expected to be delivered before harvest time.

The senator, who has had the question of getting the additional harvesters under discussion with the agency, took it up again when Oregonians wrote him that some dealers had had their quotas reduced. The agency assured him it planned to have the combines delivered on time but asked him to have Oregon growers notify him at once if it appeared a critical shortage might develop.

Training for Ship Building Offered By NYA in Oregon

The shipbuilding program in Oregon will soon need an additional 100,000 trained workers to do air-welding, machinist, marine electrician, general sheet metal, and other work. Mr. Batterson, area director of the national youth administration states.

It requires one fully loaded cargo ship to supply 100 soldiers for our soldiers. The need to supply our soldiers is vital and urgent. Boys who are trained in building ships are helping directly to win the war.

To build ships rapidly and efficiently, the shipyards must have trained workers and in order to give this training, the NYA Residence defense shops at Eugene, Albany and Chemawa, are newly equipped to provide training and work experience for your men 17 to 25 years of age in welding, machine shop, general sheet metal, and, in cooperation with the vocational department of the state, through the Eugene vocational school, training for marine electrician, ship joinery, wood-working, painting and other work that is necessary to the building of ships.

Young men trained in the above fields at NYA residence defense centers may enter the shipyards without any doubt and present wage rates and chances for employment for those who have had basic training look very favorable.

Base pay for beginning welders, for example, is \$1.12 per hour to start.

Between one and three months training is usually required for shipyard work. The length of training depends upon how much previous experience a worker has had, his ability, and his willingness to make full use of his training opportunity.

While training, boys receive \$30 per month, from which \$21 is deducted to pay for board and room facilities which are provided at the resident center. \$9 can usually be saved.

To qualify for training, one must register at United States employment offices and must be definitely and intensely interested in helping win the war by accepting employment in ship building or other war production work.

Minimum of 15 Acres Enough for Wheat Quota Vote

Every Douglas county farmer who has over 15 acres of wheat seeded this year is eligible to vote at the referendum on wheat marketing quotas May 2, according to Leo Sparks, chairman of the county AAA committee.

In reviewing marketing quota regulations, the chairman pointed out that all persons who have an interest in the wheat crop on an eligible farm may vote at the referendum, and because of Oregon's community property law, this includes wives who own farms jointly with their husbands.

Stressing the importance of every eligible voter casting his ballot, the chairman announced that absentee voters and resident voters who will not be in the county on referendum day may vote either by mail or at the county AAA office during the week preceding May 2, beginning Saturday, April 25.

Persons voting by mail may obtain a ballot from the nearest county AAA office. They should mark and sign the ballot and put it in the mails in time to be received by the county office in which the farm is located before 9 p. m. on May 2, the chairman said.

Sprague Warns Oregon on Possible Jap Reprisals

NEWPORT, April 20.—(AP)—Governor Sprague warned Oregon Saturday night about possible Japanese reprisals for the bombing of Tokyo.

He termed the bombing the "best news the people of America have heard since the war began," but added, "it will undoubtedly bring reprisals. The Japs will now bomb the Pacific coast if they can."

"I am sure that I speak for all the people of Oregon when I say that we hope our army and navy will be able to bomb Tokyo again and again, no matter what form reprisals may take. If the Japs bomb Oregon, we are ready for them. We have implicit faith in our military force's ability to make any raid on the Pacific coast a costly one."

Gen. Marshall Returns From Huddle in Europe

WASHINGTON, April 20.—(AP)—General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, was back today after two weeks in England and northern Ireland during which he conferred with British war leaders, visited American troops and forecast that "the time for action is near."

The general and Harry Hopkins, close adviser of President Roosevelt, returned to New York by air yesterday.

Four unidentified persons, described only as three high ranking British naval officers and British civilian, accompanied the general and Hopkins.

Cantonment Jobs Call For More Tires, Notice

PORTLAND, April 20.—(AP)—Logging trucks and vehicles used in cantonment construction are in dire need of more tires, Oregon rationing officials said Saturday.

Additional tire allotments were requested, and Carl B. Cadwell, secretary of the rationing administrator, said the situation was very critical all over the state. He said state and county pool quotas were exhausted.
