

### Dodgers Alone at Top of National; Higby Wins No. 1

**Boston Red Sox Gain Lead in American; Lowly Phils' Home Runs Defeat Giants**

(By the Associated Press)

The Brooklyn Dodgers and Boston Red Sox were all alone at the head of the major league pennant parades today, having earned their positions with the help of the Chicago Cubs, the Cleveland Indians, and some of that stuff the weather bureau says is not to be mentioned.

The Dodgers bounced the Boston Braves out of a three-way partnership in the National league with a 9-2 assault, while the Cubs took care of the Pittsburgh Pirates, third member of the triumvirate that shared first place before the start of yesterday's games, 8-2.

In the American league, the Red Sox dropped a 10-1 decision to the Washington Senators but clung to the lead by half a game over the New York Yankees and the St. Louis Browns.

The Yanks missed their chance to pull even with the Red Sox when their scheduled tussle with the Athletics at Philadelphia was postponed by conditions which must remain a military secret. Similar conditions possibly saved the Red Sox from further embarrassment, since a second game with the Nats had to be called off.

On top of that, the Cleveland Indians ruined the St. Louis Browns' chances of gaining the top spot by tripping the Brownsies 4-3.

At Brooklyn, the Dodgers got a seven-hit pitching performance out of Higby, who chalked up his first triumph of the year, and slammed three Boston pitchers for 11 blows.

At Pittsburgh, Butcher of the Pirates and Mottly of the Cubs hooked up in a tight pitching duel for seven innings, but the Chicagoans exploded for half a dozen runs in the eighth, putting both Butcher and the game away.

**Homers Defeat Giants**  
The Philadelphia Phils depended entirely on home runs to generate all their scoring for the second time in three days and lambasted the New York Giants on their own field, 6-3.

Glossop's homer with the bases loaded in the fourth followed a two-run four-master by Litwhiler in the third and proved to be the game winning blow as the Giants tallied three times in their half of the fourth.

The Cincinnati Reds and St. Louis Cardinals had an open date and rested for their series opener today.

At Boston, Jack Wilson returned to haunt his former Red Sox mates, as castoffs have a habit of doing, and pitched the Senators to victory with a five-hit job.

Keltner and Hockett led Cleveland's ten-hit attack on Galehouse, but it was Heath who drove in the winning run with a single, giving the nod to Al Smith for a six-hitter against the Browns.

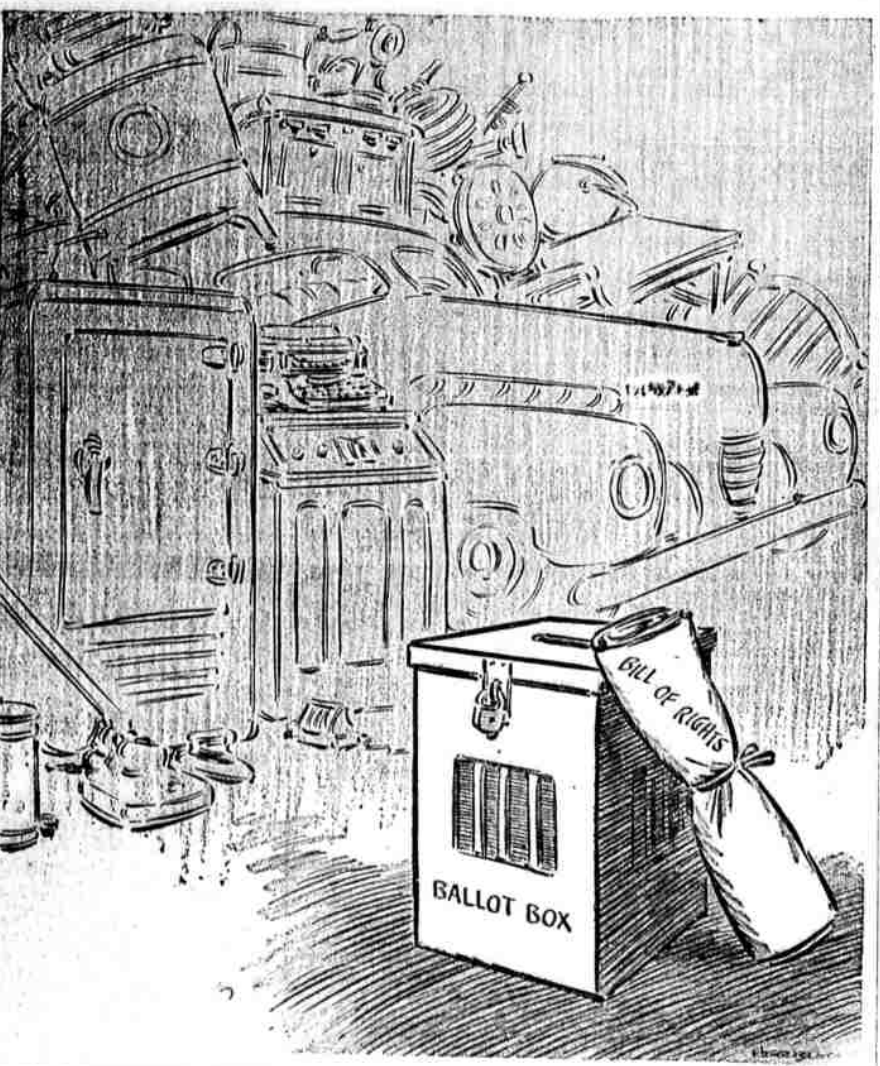

### U. of O. Football Coach Job Goes To John Warren

EUGENE, Ore., April 21.—(AP)—John Warren today took over the job of coaching the University of Oregon football squad.

His tenure, the Oregon Athletic board hopes, will be longer than the last mentor's, which was 96 hours.

The last one was Vaughn Corley, Oregon line coach, who was elevated when Head Coach Gerald "Tex" Oliver was commissioned in the navy, but who resigned within a few days to accept a navy commission himself.

Warren tried to enlist, but the navy turned him down because of his avoirdupois.

That is considered a break for Oregon football. Warren, an Oregon graduate who made an impressive record coaching an Oregon high school and the university freshmen, was selected by the athletic board last night from a string of candidates including Jim Thorpe, famed Indian athlete, and Claude "Tiny" Thornhill, former Stanford coach.

Warren was seven years at Astoria, Ore., high school, and his football teams there won 56 of 70 games, going undefeated in three seasons. In seven years as freshman coach here, his teams have won 18, lost 10 and tied 3.

Warren, incidentally, has an even more impressive record at basketball, and at the rate coaches are going off to the armed forces, his hoop knowledge might come in handy. His Astoria basketball teams won 304 of 340 games and his Oregon freshman teams 93 of 111 games.

Leroy L. Lomax, attorney for Old Age Beneficiaries, Inc., told the county welfare commission that many pensioners amounted only to \$15 monthly Clifford Leigh, leader of the organization, added, "they are starving, and I don't mean maybe."

The group asked a \$40 a month pension. Hearings were promised individual pensioners, but the commission warned that its policies were determined by state and federal agencies.
