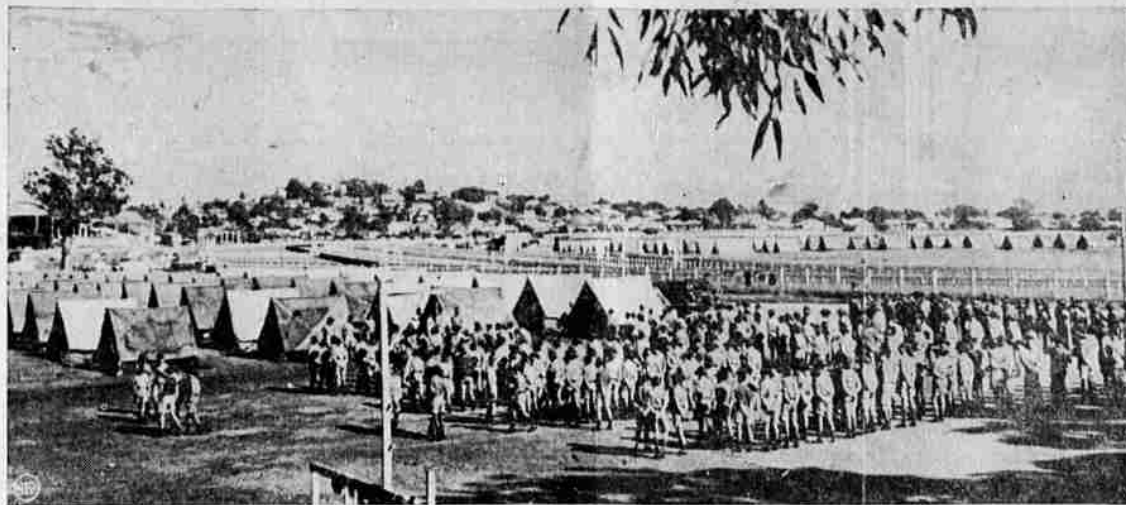
SOCK SOCIAL TO BE HELD FRIDAY NIGHT AT GRADY'S SCHOOL

Check Bills For March, Advice to U. S. Housewives

WASHINGTON, April 30.—(AP)—Mrs. America might find it pleasant and eventually profitable to check over last month's shopping bills today.

There, in her pile of receipts, she'll find an inkling of things to come—since the government slapped blanket price ceilings on practically everything she buys. Beginning May 18—retail prices on millions of articles will move back—and probably down—to March levels. Food, clothing, tobacco, and various household goods are affected, particularly the items Mrs. America finds most frequently on her shopping list.

For the duration of the war, she will pay approximately the same for bread, milk, beef, pork, sugar, ice cream, canned goods, cereals, shortening, coffee, tea, lard, spices and various other foods as she paid last month.

Eggs, fresh vegetables, flour, chickens, fresh fish, live animals and dried prunes were among the items not covered by the price ceiling because of seasonal or other reasons, but normal competition is expected to keep them down.

Mr. America, in turn, could—if able—stop worrying about his next income tax installment, and feel somewhat pleased by the knowledge that he won't have to pay any more for cigarettes or tobacco. Or suits. Or shirts. Or pajamas and socks. Or overalls.

Or aspirin tablets.

Watch The Prices

Here's what to do if you believe your dealer charges prices higher than the ceiling level effective next month:

1. Find out if the product is included in price freezing regulations.

2. Tell the retailer you believe his price is illegal.

3. If no adjustment is made ask either the local rationing board or the nearest OPA field office to investigate.

The emergency price control act provides maximum penalties of \$5,000 fine or a year's imprisonment, or both, for violations of a price administrator's regulations. OPA officials said, however, they plan to enlist the cooperation of retailers and use a maximum of the policing powers during the early months of the enforcement.

Local Ward Store Head Assigned to Expanded Service

Mr. Stucky is to head a newly installed service in which he will supervise the catalogue department and the order stores in Oregon, Washington, California, and parts of Montana and Idaho. In this service he will be employed in coordinating the mail order and retail services of 109 stores within the territory to which he has been assigned. He will make his headquarters at Oakland. The department was created as a part of the program of expanding the mail order service, Mr. Stucky states.

War Profit Limit, Labor Act Changes Get Adverse Vote

WASHINGTON, April 30.—(AP)—By a single vote margin, the house naval committee tabled today a measure to limit war profits, lift the statutory work week limit from 40 to 48 hours and freeze the status quo of closed and open shops for the duration of the war.

The vote was 13 to 12, and came shortly after Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) told the members that "the American people are going to have something to say about this racketeering in war plants and in labor unions in every congressional district in the nation in the November elections."

The action, climax of two months of stormy hearings on the profits-labor issue, backed up President Roosevelt's message to Congress earlier this week that no labor legislation was necessary at this time.

Simultaneously, it left the question of limiting war profits up to the ways and means committee, now studying the chief executive's suggestion for a \$25,000 ceiling on individual incomes after payment of taxes, along with other proposals for sharp increases in the excess profits levy.

Members of the committee are William H. Crawford, director of the Oregon economic council, chairman; State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldoock, Superintendent of State Police Charles P. Pray, Public Utilities Commissioner Ormond R. Bean, and Earl F. Campbell, Portland traffic safety commission.

Crawford will act as state administrator of the war transportation conservation program, and will assist municipal officials in developing local programs.
