States' Barriers Slow War Plans, Nelson Asserts

WASHINGTON, May 5.—(AP)—Donald M. Nelson, chairman of the war production board, demanded of state government representatives today removal of non-essential laws and regulations which hamper transportation or conservation of war materials.

Speaking to a conference of the state representatives called by President Roosevelt, the WPB director said, "We are repeatedly finding that our struggle to save these materials is being tripped up by some non-essential state or local law, not only in transportation and in building construction but all across the board."

Nelson said one of the principal problems was the confusion of state and local laws which limit the size, cargo and other features of commercial trucking.

He continued, "We have an acute shortage of paint brush bristles—and we keep running into local ordinances which limit the use of spray painting equipment. We want to conserve the material that is used to make flour sacks—and we can't simplify sack sizes effectively because of the conflicts in state laws governing those sizes."

"Tin plate is of very great strategic importance—but just recently one state passed a law setting standard sizes for baking pans, the effect of which was to compel commercial bakers to buy a lot of new pans. We are trying to substitute commoner materials for stainless steel—but state dairy inspectors continue to insist that nothing but stainless steel be used in dairying and food-processing operations where substitutions could very properly be made."

Officer's Bullet Fatal To Burglary Suspect

OREGON CITY, May 5.—(AP)—One man died after a gun battle with a state patrolman near here yesterday, and another was arrested.

Trooper Robert Ragsdale, answering a burglar alarm in early morning, exchanged shots with two men he found in a store at Mullino, 10 miles from here.

A few hours later Raymond Fay Brady, 39, Imperial, Neb., was discovered wounded in a roadside ditch. Wayne Gurdane, state police captain, said he admitted, before dying, that he had served a term in the Nebraska penitentiary for automobile theft. He said he was alone at the Mullino store.

Nevertheless police arrested another man after a day-long search, and Gurdane said he was with Brady in the gun battle. He was booked at the Clackamas county jail as Charles Robinson, alias Charles Gardner, 31, Imperial, Neb.

Oregon Gets No Legion Air Raid Warden School

SALEM, May 5.—(AP)—An American legion training school for air raid wardens will not be located in Oregon because civilian defense training of wardens already has progressed satisfactorily so that such a school is not needed, Jerrold Owen, state civilian defense coordinator, said today on his return from Indianapolis where he attended a conference of legion officials.

National legion headquarters will urge Oregon legionnaires to attend civilian protection schools to be held jointly by the army and office of civilian defense in the northwest.

Owen said that the legion has prepared films and slides on air raid duties and that these would be made available to Oregon legion posts soon.

Wages Soar at Tulelake Jap Evacuee Settlement

KLAMATH FALLS, May 5.—(AP)—Pay checks are soaring for a few workmen at the Tulelake Japanese resettlement camp, being rushed to completion this month.

Approximately 50 steamfitters and plumbers are working a 12-hour day, seven days a week, and at \$1.87 an hour plus time and a half for overtime their checks go up to \$198.42 weekly.

Ordinary labor gets 87 1/2 cents an hour, and, if workmen are on the 12-hour schedule, checks can reach \$92.75 weekly.

Not all workmen can stand the long hours, however, and Joe Willis, secretary of the AFL Klamath building trades council, said more than 500 men have been brought in for the job, expected to be completed about May 20.
