Ouster Order Affects Japs in Two Oregon Areas

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—(AP)—Twenty two hundred Japanese were today ordered evacuated within a week from two California and two Oregon counties.

The three orders affect all Japanese in Clackamas county, Ore., all those not previously removed from Multnomah county, Ore.; all of Kings county, Calif., and all of Tulare county, Calif., that lies within military area 1.

The latest of the ever-increasing exclusion orders issued by Lieut. General J. L. DeWitt, commanding general of the western defense command and the Fourth army, will put the program of clearing 112,000 estimated Japanese from the west coast combat zone past the halfway mark.

In a desperate foray against British warships.

The communique said British gunners sank the 1,379-ton submarine Beveziers and the Bougainville, variously described as an auxiliary cruiser and a light cruiser, and damaged a small French auxiliary cruiser. Most of the crews were saved.

Madagascar's land forces were estimated in London at 1,500 Frenchmen and 3,700 colonials.

Vichy dispatches said several British planes were shot down by anti-aircraft guns and some of the light British tanks put ashore had been destroyed.

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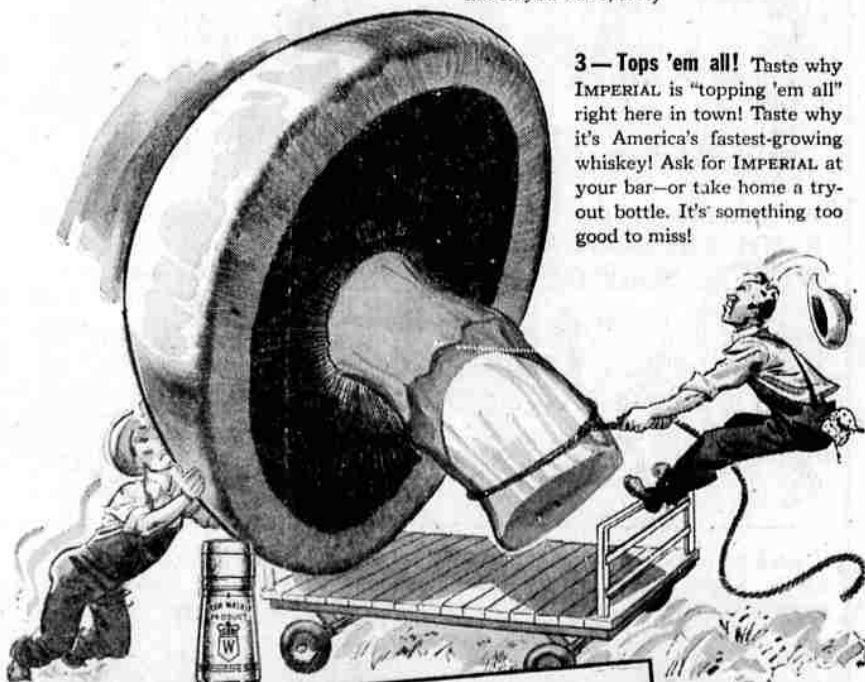
