

Bonham Shuts Out Cleveland to Put Yanks in 1st Spot

Mr. Big among all the pitchers in the major leagues this year seems likely to be Bonham of the New York Yankees.

"Tiny" is perfectly cast for the part, because he stands 6 feet 2 and weighs 215 pounds. But more than that he has won the first four games this spring, three by shutouts, and yesterday he subdued the Cleveland Indians 3-0 to return the Yankees to the pinnacle of the American league.

It was Cleveland's fourth straight loss after winning 13 in a row and dropped the tribe into a tie for second with the Boston Red Sox, who nosed out the Chicago White Sox 3-1.

The latter game was a stirring pitching duel between Lyons and Dobson, each of whom allowed six hits. Lyons could cope with all the Red Soxers except Doerr, who hit a home run in the eighth and another with one on in the ninth to account for all Boston's runs. Chicago's only tally also was a homer by Rookie Leo Wells, who was one of an entire new infield Manager Dykes started in an effort to break his club's string of 13 losses in 14 games.

Buck Newsom pushed back into the spotlight by pitching the Washington Senators to a 7-0 shutout of the Detroit Tigers on one hit—a triple by Cramer.

Auker submarined the St. Louis Browns to a 7-2 decision over the Philadelphia Athletics by keeping seven hits scattered.

Only one game in the National league escaped inclement weather and in this the St. Louis Cardinals plastered an 11-2 defeat on the last place Phils.

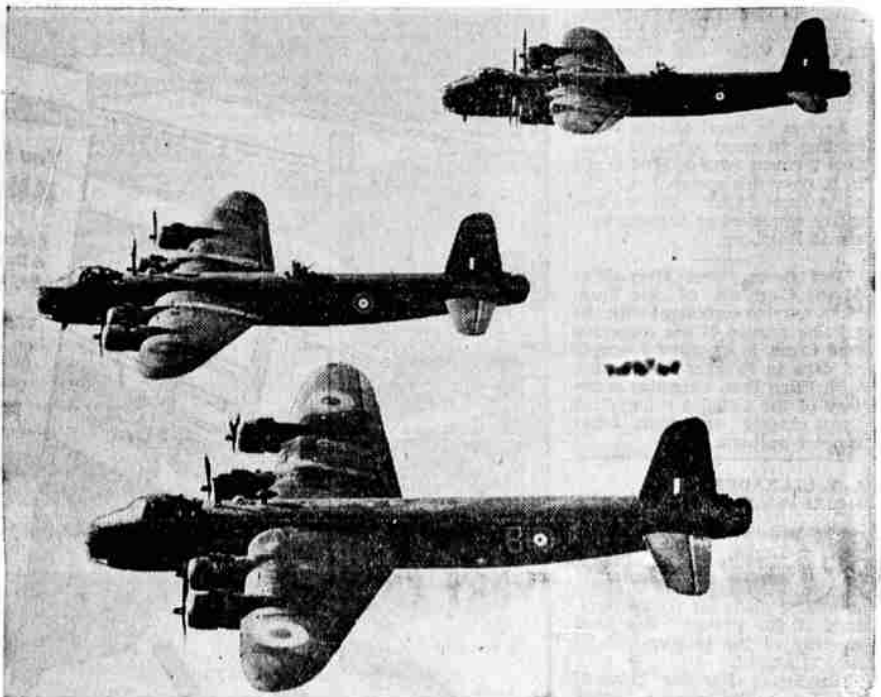
And now it was the greeting of a couple of pals that were hooked up together in the greatest achievement in turf history.

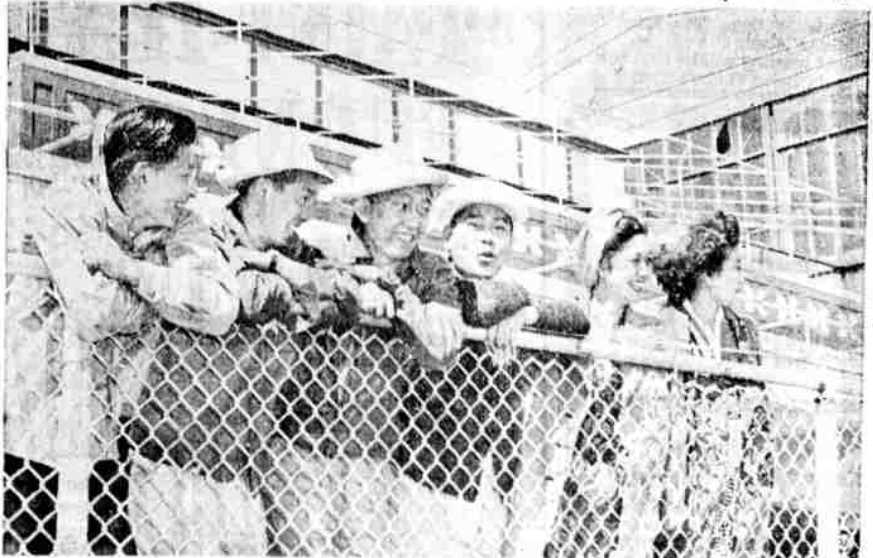


Triple Threat Against the Axis

This was still some \$5,000 short of Sun Beau's \$376,714 second-place standing in the all-time money winning lists, and about \$66,000 behind Seabiscuit's record.

Seattle and Los Angeles, top contenders for Pacific Coast league baseball honors, went down to defeat for the second consecutive time last night as the trailing San Francisco club upset the fourth-place San Diego squad.

Westlake, Oakland outfielder, came through with a double in the tenth frame against Seattle to give the Oaks a 5 to 4 win and a second-place tie in league standings with Los Angeles.

It was the second night the Oaks won from the Rainiers, who now hold a game and a half lead in the coast pennant tussle.

At Sacramento, Portland dropped to the next-to-last step of the standings ladder as the solons pounded Singleton for four runs in the second frame and blanked the Beavers, 7 to 0.

Brand Motor Tires as Theft Barrier, Advice

Motor car owners, plagued by the menace of tire thievery at a time when tires are virtually irreplaceable, can take a trip from the cowpuncher and foil "rubber rustlers" by branding their tires, according to H. T. Hansen of the Hansen Motor company. With equipment recently obtained at the local Chevrolet agency, service men now burn the owner's initials into the sidewalls of the tires, insuring ready identification of stolen tires and thus de-

termining theft by such identification. The brand cannot be erased by buffing, Mr. Hansen states, but it does not shorten the life of the tire or weaken it from a safety standpoint.
