American Legion Auxiliary Activities

Had you rather work with people or with things? So asked Dean J. R. Jewell of the state board of education in speaking to the seniors of Roseburg high this week. So plan your life work that you will work with the one you enjoy the most, he said. Find some occupation which is broadening out, he said, like the large end of the sousa phone, avoid the one which is like the other end. Legion groups have sponsored education week for many years and has been happy to help with music week. Roseburg is fortunate to have such excellent musicians.

Today the Legion is endorsing another broadening program, that of universal draft laws.

Oregon was among the first to advocate immediate passage of such a bill. They desire that "all wealth, labor, industry and agriculture be immediately mobilized for service under a universal service act. The president's 7-point proclamation has gone far toward this end but the Legion believes that he has not gone far enough. There should be no exceptions, they believe. There are those who are objecting, "those few paunchy tycoons who will have to readjust their living to a \$25,000 basis; a few labor dictators who have a toll gate at the entrance defense plant and don't want their racket interfered with; a few farmer politicians who... never saw... a farm." A bill is now before the congress presented at the request of the Legion. These men who saw men whose eyes were blasted out at Pearl Harbor, who knew of men who swam to death in burning oil, are leading a crusade against selfishness, against profiteering, against disloyalty. To win the war means less pay, less play, they state; more sacrifice and less profit.

For families of those boys the American Legion Auxiliary will soon sell small red paper poppies. Proceeds will be used for veterans of both wars and their families. The field day which is held in Roseburg at the veterans' facility each July 4th is aided by money obtained from this source. Thanksgiving, Christmas, child welfare, service men's recreation and many other programs are made possible because someone thought of the help he could be by obtaining a small poppy.
