F. M. Lambert Aspires To Nomination for Secretary of State



Francis Lambert, above, democratic candidate for secretary of state, son of a Yamhill county pioneer family of 1843, was born in Portland in 1902. After attending public schools in Portland, Mr. Lambert went to work in a logging camp. The next five years he worked at various occupations in logging camps, sawmills and on construction jobs until 1924 when he joined the Trucon Steel company as a laborer. He soon advanced to assistant superintendent acquiring a practical knowledge of cost accounting.

After 1931 Lambert was employed by the state highway department as construction foreman and the Multnomah county road department where his knowledge of cost accounting was again put in practical operation. While Lambert was still employed at Trucon Steel company he entered Northwestern College of Law where for the next five years his nights were devoted to the study of law. In 1936 he was elected Multnomah county treasurer and after his first term in office he went back to the polls for re-election, receiving the largest vote ever cast for the office.

Taking an active part in civil affairs he served on the board of directors of the Portland Philharmonic orchestra. He is treasurer of the Oregon Roadside council and is a member of the board of directors of the Multnomah county chapter, American Red Cross. Lambert has a sincere interest in

the activities and problems of youth. He is a past chairman of the Junior Red Cross, a past-president of the Active club, a member of the Boys and Girls Aid society and is finance chairman of the Spirit Lake camp committee.

Lambert says he will make few promises and keep them. His major concern will be to eliminate waste and needless expense. He feels that every potential state effort should be directed to winning the war and that careful plans must be made now for post-war readjustments.

Martin T. Warlick Democratic Candidate For Seat in Congress



Marvin T. Warlick, above, democratic candidate for representative in congress, was born in Florida and received his B. A. degree at Henderson State college in Arkansas. He joined the army in 1918 and after his return from military service engaged in farming in West Texas, where he specialized in certified seed and registered Poland China hogs.

He was appointed farm superintendent of Texas Tech school of Agriculture in 1924, later resigning to manage and take an interest in a large seed farm.

He came to Oregon in 1930 and has been serving as business manager of the Eugene hospital and clinic for the past 11 years in addition to operating his mountain farm "Shangrila" on Smith river.

Mr. and Mrs. Warlick have two children, Jane and Tom, both students in University of Oregon. Mr. Warlick is an active worker in the Methodist church, American Legion and chamber of commerce. His statement as a candidate for nomination from the fourth congressional district is as follows:

"I am in this race because I want to do something worth while for the people of this district. There must be no party politics at the expense of our country. We must have a 'total surrender' of the dictator nations before peace comes. Peace must be based on solid democratic principles of fairness and justice to all people alike.

"While our district has mineral and other resources that our nation needs and is spending billions of dollars to import and yet not one dollar of our tax money is being spent to develop our resources, we are having 'taxation without representation.'

"I will face the social problems of today with courage and my feet on the ground. Legislation to meet them must be constructive and most of all practical.

"Labor and capital should be measured with the same yardstick. Neither of them should be put in a straight jacket. They must and will make whatever sacrifices are necessary, whether it is hours or profits.

"I do not promise all things to all people, but I will represent every class fairly. My one cam-

paign promise is: 'In congress I will be thinking of the next generation and not of the next election.'

"On my record and on the faith you have in me, I ask for your votes."

Justice James T. Brand Asks for Another Term



James T. Brand, above, is associate justice of the supreme court of Oregon, having been appointed to that office a year ago. He will submit himself to the voters on May 15 as a candidate for election to the same office on the non-partisan judiciary ballot.

Justice Brand has had wide judicial experience. In 1927 he was appointed judge of the circuit court for the second judicial district, comprising Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lincoln, Benton and Lane counties. He was elected by the voters of the six counties in 1928, re-elected in 1934 and 1940 and served with distinction until his appointment to the supreme court.

He entered the general practice of law in Marshfield in 1914 and continued until 1927. During his incumbency as circuit judge, he served as president of the Oregon Bar association and as a member of the first board of governors of the Oregon State bar. He is a member of the county, state and American Bar associations and of the American Law Institute, is the author of numerous treatises in legal periodicals. He served as lecturer on jurisprudence at the Oregon Law school in the summer of 1937. He is a Mason, a Kiwanian and a Presbyterian.

Justice Brand is endorsed and recommended by the Coos and Curry County Bar associations.

Reds' New Fighting Technique



A new kind of aerial warfare is being fought high in the skies over Soviet Russia today. No longer is a dog fight between enemy planes over when both sides run out of ammunition. Red air force pilots have worked out three systems of attack, sketched above, to knock out nazi bombers after all ammunition has been fired.

The "Clip and Run," least dangerous to the attacking pilot, but one of the most difficult to maneuver, involves making slight contact with enemy's wing or tail with attacker's own wing.

Simplest, but most dangerous to attacking pilot, is the "Cracker-Upper." This attack is a direct ramming of the enemy ship.

"The Buzz-Saw" is one of the surest, requires consummate flying skill. In this gun-less attack, fighter pilot noses up behind enemy, slices vital part of enemy fuselage—stabilizer and rudder, for example—with his propeller.

Soviet pilots have used all three systems with excellent results, losing few of their own planes. Success depends on pilot's skill in dropping away from rammed enemy plane a split second after contact, thus avoiding becoming tangled up in falling enemy wreckage.
