

### Turpin Duels Trio Of Angel Hurlers In 15-Frame Tie

Seattle and Los Angeles, the two top-ranking teams of the Pacific coast baseball loop, played 15 innings of baseball without settling any differences last night.

The game, the longest contest of the coast league season, ended at midnight in accordance with the circuit's curfew rule with the two teams tied at five runs each.

The Rainier's ace twirler, Hal Turpin, took on three Angel hurlers in a mound duel, and gave up 15 hits to 12 bingles allowed by Dobernie, Raffensberger and Gehman.

All of the Seattle tallies came in the sixth inning during a four-hit rally. The Angels trailed until the ninth when they scored a run to tie the game. Neither team was able to rally for a score during the six extra innings.

**Seals Beat Portland.**

At San Francisco, however, the Seals took advantage of a single extra inning to ease past Portland, 4 to 3, as Beaver hurler, Schafer, blew up and walked three batters. First Baseman Fain then tapped a short center-field hit to score the winning run.

### R. H. S. Baseball Team Wins From Glide, 14 to 1

The Roseburg high school baseball team won another game yesterday, defeating Glide 14 to 1 in a six-inning contest at Glide. Roseburg had little trouble in running up their easy lead by virtue of nine hits and four Glide errors. Dick Pendergast again hurled for Roseburg and turned in a four-hit performance while allowing one walk and striking out seven batters. Marr, Glide pitcher, was credited with six strikeouts, one walk, one hit batsman. Roseburg was able to use all fifteen players taken on the trip and thus give experience to several new players.

Roseburg opened the scoring in the first inning with a clean single by White, who was advanced to third on a sacrifice and then scored on an error. The locals continued rolling in runs as five more crossed the plate in the second inning on two hits, a walk, a hit batsman, a fielder's choice and an error. Two more were added in the third, one in the fourth, three in the fifth and a final two in the sixth. The last two were scored by virtue of Olson's long home run with Falps on base.

Marr was hitting star for Glide, getting two for three including a triple after two were down in the first nine. Hughes and White each got two for three for the Indians. Hughes, Baker and Anderson each hit doubles while Olson hit a home run and Marr, Glide, hit a triple.

Roseburg plays Glide here Friday afternoon and then closes the season at Grants Pass Saturday. The last home game will be this Friday afternoon.

### Thompson Holds Dodgers to 1 Hit In Cincy Triumph

Gene (Junior) Thompson, pitcher of the Cincinnati Reds, opposing Brooklyn yesterday came within one blow of the no-hit game all hurlers dream about.

The only hit off Thompson was a pinch double in the sixth inning by his former teammate, Lew Riggs, and it set up a run that cheated Thompson of even a shutout. The Reds won 5-1.

Cincinnati's triumph bunched all four clubs in the first division within four games, but Brooklyn's 24 game margin over the second place Pittsburgh Pirates was not harmed because the New York Giants bowled over the Buccaneers 7-3.

The Giants sprung a triple play, the first of the year in the majors, and rallied twice for four and three runs to help Melton achieve his fourth triumph.

The Chicago Cubs managed to stop the rush of the Boston Braves, but only by a narrow 9-8 margin. The Braves tallied five time sin an effort to catch up in the eighth, two of the runs coming on a pinch homer by Tobin, who will pitch today.

Likewise the Philadelphia Phils cooled off the St. Louis Cardinals 3-2 behind the six-hit hurling of Hoerst.

All the games in the American league were postponed except the Philadelphia Athletics' struggle at St. Louis and Rookie Jack Walensa won this for the A's 5-4 with a three-run homer in late eighth inning. Credit for the victory went to Marchildon, but he was rescued by Calligiri when the Browns loaded the bases with one out in the eighth. Calligiri promptly fanned Stephens and Criscola.
