Miscellaneous
I HAVE BEEN ASKED to enforce this ordinance 100 per cent. Please watch your dogs. IN THE CITY OF ROSEBURG. No dog shall be allowed to run at large or be in or upon any street, alley, park, highway or public place within the City of Roseburg, Oregon, unless the owner or person in charge of such dog shall accompany and control the same. For violation of this city ordinance the keeper or owner may be fined five dollars to twenty-five dollars or imprisoned in the city jail from two and one-half to twelve and one-half days or by both fine and imprisonment. UNLICENSED DOGS cost the owner or keeper about \$15.00. Dog licenses cost \$1.00 and \$1.50.
Section 322415, provides: Penalty for failure to take out license. Any owner or keeper of any dog who shall fail to procure a license, as provided in Section 322414 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each offense, together with costs of the proceedings.
