

Volunteers For Fighting Forest Fire Sought Here

Organization of a large force of reserves to aid in fighting forest fires is being undertaken by the U. S. forest service, with the cooperation of the county civilian defense council. Applications from volunteers now are being accepted at the office of the Roseburg chamber of commerce, as well as at the forest service office.

The majority of the positions for which membership in the fire fighting reserves are open are for men, but women will be accepted to serve as timekeepers, telephone operators, typists and culinary workers.

Places for which volunteer reservists are needed include look-out, smoke-chaser, fire fighter, fire foreman, fire scout, camp boss, timekeeper, cook, culinary aid, first aid, radio operator, telephone operator, patrolman registrar, saw filer, equipment clerk, equipment servicer, purchasing agent, commissary clerk, searcher, watchman, tractor operator, pump operator, truck driver, assistant fire dispatcher, packer, warehouseman, carter, airplane dropper, law officer, typist, messenger, draftsman, recorder, prevention guard.

It is requested that persons with experience in any of these departments register for service, as well as those willing to accept training.

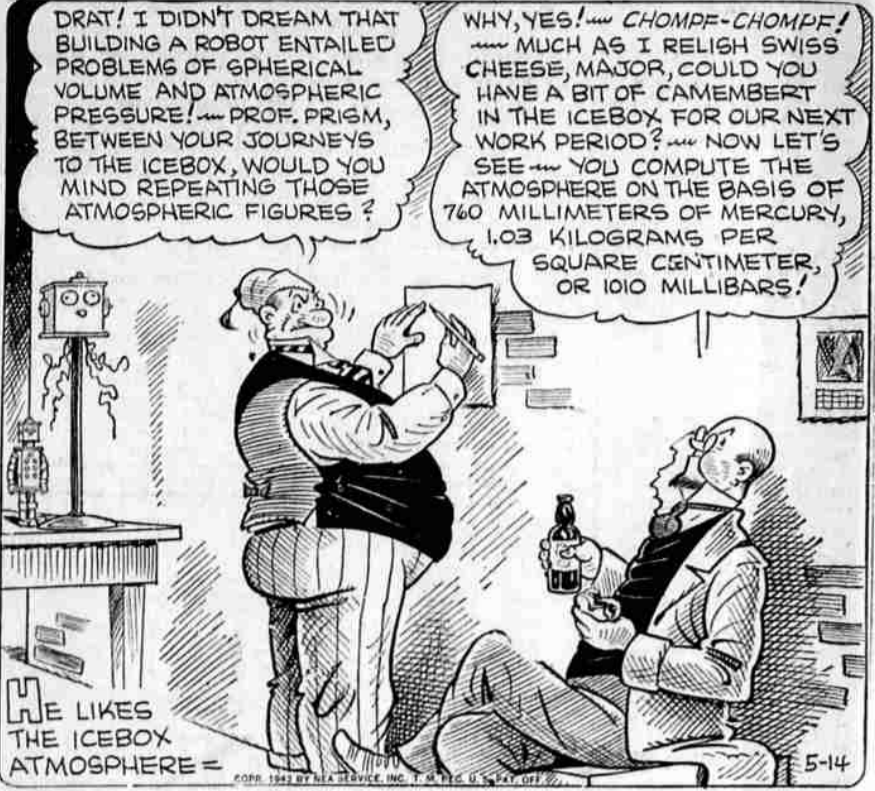

Northwest Clams Hold Poison, Exam Reveals

PORTLAND, May 13—(AP)—Northwest clams were found to contain poison when given toxicity examinations by the George William Hooper foundation at the University of California medical school, the Oregon board of health reported today.

State Health Officer Dr. W. H. Stricker was notified that a higher degree of toxicity was present in clams of the Washington coast than those taken from Oregon beaches.

Dr. Stricker said periodic checks of mussels and clams would be made along Oregon beaches throughout the summer to determine when the ban against digging clams could be lifted.

No Return for Ousted Salem School Students

SALEM, May 13—(AP)—The seven Salem high school students who were expelled last week because they paddled a boy who refused to join their secret society will not be permitted to return to school this school year, the Salem school board decided last night at a meeting with the parents of the seven boys.

The board said drastic action is necessary to wipe out secret societies.

Ellsworth Leads Both Rivals In Coos Straw Vote

The first reported straw vote in advance of the primary election to be held Friday was announced today from Marshfield, where the vote was taken at the meeting of the Coos Bay Rotary club. The club members were equally divided on the republican race for governor with Charles Sprague and Earl Snell tied with 14 votes each.

For U. S. senator, Charles L. McNary led Arthur M. Geary for the republican nomination, 23 to 3.

Harris Ellsworth of Roseburg drew 16 votes for republican congressman from the fourth district, while Boehnke of Eugene received 5 and Simon of Eugene, 2. In the democratic congressional contest, Kelly of Medford and Warlick of Eugene, tied with 4 each. Latourette led Wallace, 5 to 3.

Going East? Gas Ration Cards Required, Warning

Westerners planning to drive their automobiles to any of the 17 eastern states, where gas rationing becomes effective May 15, today were warned by Richard Montgomery, Oregon state director of OPA, that they will have to abide by the regulations in those areas.

"Tourists to these states," Montgomery explained, "will be issued 'A' ration cards, the same as issued to residents who do not use their cars for vocational purposes. The amount of gasoline to be made available to each car owner has not yet been determined. It may be assumed, however, that it will not be sufficiently large for any extensive traveling.

"As everyone knows, the supply of gasoline in the east is strictly limited. It would be both patriotic

and wise if persons residing out of that area would not make further inroads on that supply."
