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## Anniversary of Red Cross

YESTERDAY was the 61st an-  
niversary of that mild spring  
evening when a little group of  
men and women gathered in Cla-  
ra Barton's house on Eye street,  
Washington, and organized what  
now is the American Red Cross.

Somehow it seems presump-  
tuous to introduce the Red Cross  
to the American public. Its  
achievements in the field of ap-  
plied mercy, its contributions to  
the alleviation of suffering, in  
war and in peace, would seem to  
have publicized this magnificent  
organization "far above our poor  
power to add or detract."

And yet, sometimes we take for  
granted the benefactor who al-  
ways stands ready with a helping  
hand. We forget that behind that  
unintended generosity lies the  
self-sacrifice of thousands whose  
glory it is to serve humanity.

In time of peace we think of  
the Red Cross, most of us, on oc-  
casions. One is when we make  
a little donation for the annual  
roll call. The other is when  
some major disaster—earthquake,  
flood, famine, explosion—brings  
into swift play the efficient ma-  
chinery which has been built up  
over the 61 years since Clara Bar-  
ton started the movement in this  
country.

But today we are reminded of  
the Red Cross dramatically by  
what it is doing for our soldiers,  
sailors and marines. The Red  
Cross is sending food and cloth-  
ing to Americans imprisoned in  
Italy and Germany, is checking  
prison camp conditions, is arrang-  
ing for mail to reach our boys  
captured by the Japanese.

Already some 600,000 sweaters,  
socks, mufflers, helmets, sea  
boots, scarfs and other knitted  
articles have been shipped to our  
fighting men. More than 7,000,  
000 garments have been sent for  
the relief of war victims.

More than 30,000,000 surgical  
dressings have been made and  
sent to Europe, and more than  
40,000,000 to our own Army and  
Navy hospitals.

The Red Cross is operating 18  
blood donation centers, seeking  
to collect 1,280,000 pints of blood  
for transfusions for the wounded.  
It is estimated that of all the  
men who have passed through  
our army camps, one out of eight  
has received assistance from the  
Red Cross.

These are figures, accurate but  
neither cold nor hard. They are  
figures of mercy, made possible  
because millions have donated  
money and thousands have given  
themselves, in work.

This is not an appeal for mon-  
ey. The Red Cross has no finan-  
cial drive on now.

Th's is just a reminder of a  
very few of the things that the  
Red Cross, on its 61st birthday, is  
doing for the relief of distress.

## Victory

EMPEROR HIROHITO, Nip-  
ponese Son of Heaven, has  
commended his naval commander  
for the crushing victory over  
American-Australian forces in the  
Coral Sea.

The maximum Japanese claims  
appear to be eight United Na-  
tions ships sunk or damaged and  
98 planes shot down. On the other  
hand, we claim flatly and of-  
ficially that we sank 11 warships  
and damaged six more in the  
Coral Sea engagement alone, plus  
several later. Our claims hith-  
erto have proven conservative.

A few such Japanese victories  
may indeed prove fatal for Hiro-

hito and the axis cause in the Far  
East.

## Newlyweds' Homes

THE OPA's decision to limit in-  
stallment buying works an  
unintended and unfortunate hard-  
ship on newlyweds.

Unless they can save in ad-  
vance, or borrow or beg the mon-  
ey, young couples will find it hard  
to furnish their homes. Under  
the regulations there must be a  
down payment of at least 20 per  
cent on furniture, as on other  
things, and the balance must be  
paid within a year.

The only solution Mr. Hender-  
son's experts have found is for  
the youngsters to buy a few gen-  
eral utility pieces at a time, in-  
stead of outfitting the home all at  
once.

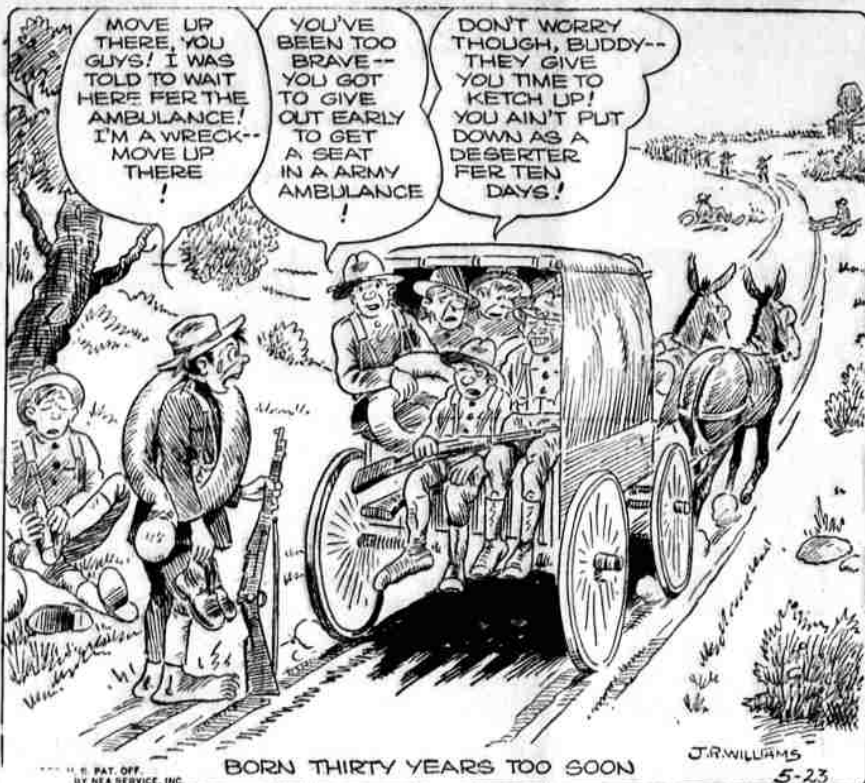

## R. H. S. Baseball Season End Finds White Top Hitter

The Roseburg high school base-  
ball season was brought to a close  
last Tuesday when the locals de-  
feated Glide 6 to 0. This climaxed  
a successful season which netted  
five victories and one loss, in-  
cluding Dick Pendergast's no-hit  
no-run game in mid-season. Coach  
"Hod" Turner expressed great  
pleasure in the showing which  
the locals made during their sec-  
ond year of baseball since that  
sport was put back in as an inter-  
school sport.

Jimmy White, diminutive  
catcher for the Indians, emerged  
the batting leader for the locals  
with a .450 average. White pound-  
ed out at least one hit in each  
game totalling nine hits in twen-  
ty times at bat. Denton Talbert  
rated a close second, hitting the  
ball at a .421 clip. Jack Loomis,  
freshman first baseman, also did  
a nice job of hammering the ball  
as well as covering the initial  
sack with ease and agility. His  
average was .363.

## Two Lettermen Lost

The locals will lose only two of  
this year's lettermen by gradua-  
tion. These two are Ed Hughes,  
centerfielder, and Ralph Sand-  
sted, third baseman. Both of  
these boys have made two base-  
ball letters. The turnout this  
year, according to Coach Turner,  
was much better than last year  
and almost every boy who started  
at the beginning of the season  
stayed throughout the entire cam-  
paign and so gained valuable  
playing experience. Most of the  
boys played in at least a part of  
one or more contests.

## Bonham of Yanks Hurls 4th Blank; Chisox Victim, 1-0

The New York Yankees seem  
to win their pennants by break-  
ing the hearts as well as the  
backs of their rivals.

Yesterday the Chicago White  
Sox sent out to the mound south-  
paw Ed Smith, who hadn't won  
a game this year and had been  
beaten five times. Smith pitched  
well, held the world champions  
to one run, and still they beat  
him.

It was Smith's misfortune to  
have to match his 0.5 record  
against the 5-0 star of the Yankee  
hurling corps, Bonham, the big  
right-hander, who promptly pitch-  
ed his fourth shutout and sixth  
victory of the season.

The 1-0 score was determined  
in the fourth inning when Smith  
walked Rosar with the bases  
loaded to force in a run.  
Hudson pitched six-hit ball to  
lead the Washington Senators to  
a 5-2 verdict over the St. Louis  
Brons although his teammates al-  
most sabotaged the job with six  
errors.

Marchildon, looming as one of  
this season's finest fingers, held  
the Detroit Tigers to six hits as  
the Philadelphia Athletics ham-  
mered three pitchers for 17 blows  
and an 11-3 triumph that lifted

the A's into fifth place. It was  
Marchildon's sixth win.

Rookie Tex Hughson pitched  
seven-hit ball to the Boston Red  
Sox against the Cleveland Indi-  
ans and Ted Williams drove in  
four runs, two of them on his  
ninth home run of the season, for  
an 8-3 victory.

This knocked the Indians back  
a full game from first place,  
with which they had flirted earli-  
er in the week while the Yankees  
were idle.

Only one game in the National  
league escaped the weather and  
in this the Philadelphia Philis-  
nosied out the Cincinnati Reds 3-2  
as St. Johnson bested Derringer  
in a hurling duel. Johnson held  
the Redlegs to six hits.

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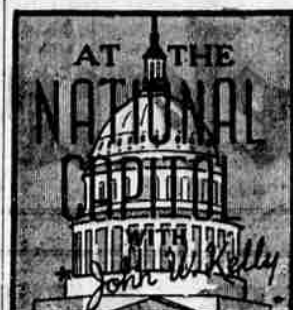
