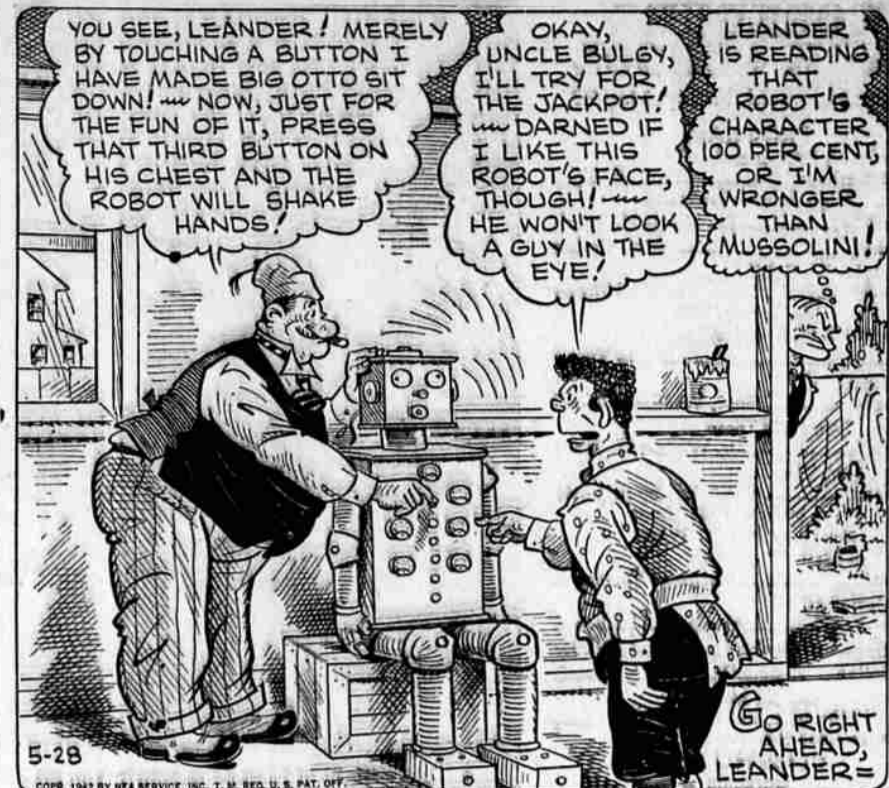
Mr. and Mrs. Loson Winn were in Roseburg Saturday attending the funeral of a friend.
