

Half-Blind Hurler Hands Dodgers 2nd Seven-Hit Defeat

Tom Sunkel, a 29-year-old left-handed pitcher who is blind, or practically so, in his left eye, today is the toast of seven clubs in the senior circuit because he is the pitcher who has handed the swashbuckling Brooklyn Dodgers their last two defeats.

Manager Ott of the Giants sprung him on the National league champs last Saturday simply because he was a southpaw, and he downed the Dodgers on seven hits.

Yesterday he pitched another seven-hitter at Brooklyn, this time over a ten-inning route, and whipped the Dodgers again 3-1. Sunkel had to be good because head pitched no-hit ball against the Giants for seven innings.

The Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds battled into extra innings for the second day in a row and the Cubs won again, 6-5, with a run in the 11th as Beggs walked pinchhitter Dallesandro with the bases loaded. Passeau was the winning hurler.

Melton pitched a six-hitter for the Phils to beat the Boston Braves, 2-1. It was the Braves' third straight loss.

The New York Yankees captured their 18th victory in 21 games, 16-1, at the expense of the Washington Senators. Pitcher Lefty Gomez, who made four of the Yankees' 17 himself, made only nine hits all last season.

A similar slugging show was staged by the Boston Red Sox at Philadelphia in beating the Athletics, 14-2, with Ted Williams smashing two home runs, one in the first inning with two on and another in the eighth with the bases loaded. They were his 13th and 14th of the year. Doerr also homered and behind this 13-hit barrage Hughson pitched seventh-inning ball to give the A's their sixth straight setback.

The Detroit Tigers tore into the Cleveland Indians for a 14-3 victory.

The Chicago White Sox made a spectacular surge of nine runs in the last two innings to come from behind and beat the St. Louis Browns, 12-8, after the Browns scored six runs in the fourth inning.

4 Home Runs Mark San Francisco Win Over Portland

Model, Two Men Pals Found Guilty Of \$13 Murder

NEW YORK, May 30.—(AP)—Madeline Webb, who will be 29 in three days, will spend this birthday and probably all the rest of her birthday in jail, as the penalty for taking part in a murder that netted \$13.

A jury convicted her last night of first degree murder in the March 4 robbery-slaying of Mrs. Susan Flora Reich, but recommended mercy—that meant life imprisonment.

All her moans—"Please, judge, I didn't do it, please"—could not not shake the verdict.

Her lover, Eli Shonbrun, pleaded for her, too. "She's as innocent as my mother, judge," he sobbed, even as the jury announced a sterner verdict for him.

Shonbrun and a third defendant, John D. Cullen, were found guilty of first degree murder without a mercy recommendation, automatically dooming them to death in the electric chair.

The three were convicted of killing Mrs. Reich in the course of robbing her of a \$1,500 diamond ring. Testimony showed they never were able to sell the diamond, and that the sale of the ring's mounting netted only \$13.

Draft Rejections For Brains Lack Startles F. D. R.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(AP)—President Roosevelt asserted yesterday that the government was trying to decide whether to ought to try to educate the many men now being turned down for military service because of low intelligence ratings.

No plan has been evolved, the chief executive announced, but he said he had discussed the matter with Major General Lewis H. Hershey, selective service director, and John W. Studebaker, federal education commissioner.

Mr. Roosevelt said figures which startled him had been laid before him, that an amazingly large number of men are being rejected, not because they are morons, but largely because they had lacked a chance for education.

He said he was not referring to only academic education, in the sense of reading and writing, although that was necessary, too. Asked what kind of training the under-educated needed, since they apparently required little learning to fire a gun, the president said they needed to have their wits sharpened.

Perhaps this should be done through a manual, vocational process, he suggested.

Mr. Roosevelt said he had not yet taken up with Hershey the question of whether youths 18 and 19 years old should be subjected to compulsory military service.

Pears and Apples, Irish Spuds Off Blue Stamp List

Three items, fresh pears, fresh apples and Irish potatoes, have been removed from the June list of foods which Federal Stamp Plan customers in the state of Oregon may purchase with blue stamps during the month of June, it was announced today by Ray B. Schwartz, area supervisor for the Agricultural Marketing Administration.

The full list of blue stamp foods designated by the Secretary of Agriculture for June includes: Corn meal, shell eggs, dried prunes, hominy (corn) grits, butter, dry edible beans, wheat flour and whole wheat (graham) flour, enriched wheat flour, fresh or anger, fresh grapefruit, and all fresh vegetables. Fresh vegetables do not include avocados, melons, rhubarb, or Irish potatoes.

Following an investigation conducted by the Agricultural Marketing Administration of the Department of Agriculture into the handling of food stamps under the Food Stamp Plan, six retail food merchants of Washington, and Idaho were denied the privilege of participating in the program.

Criminal actions have also been instituted against a number of food dealers and others who filed false claims.

Family of Six Held in Ory of Shoplifting

WALLA WALLA, May 29.—(AP)—A family of six was held today on an open charge in connection with shoplifting in Oregon, Washington and southern Idaho, Police Chief A. L. Jeffries said.

The group arrested includes two men, their wives and two juveniles. Nearly \$1,000 in loot from Pasco, Kennewick, Walla Walla, Baker and Eugene, Ore., Buhl and Twin Falls Idaho, was recovered.
